OFFICIALS CLOSE ON THE THIEF'S TRACK.

Denver, Colo., Dec. 12.—A number of stolen Oregon Short Line tickets have found their way to Denver, and into the possession of ticket sellers here. The tickets are for the month of December, running from Ogallala, Neb., to Salt Lake City, via Cheyenne. They were issued at Brigham station a few days ago. The Oregon Short Line officials claim to be hot on the track of the person that disposed of the tickets in this city and promise sensational developments when he is finally run down.

The short line line officials are very positive about it, and believe they have got him. They are also training the other about it from time to time, that they may be able to find him. They are certain that it will not cause the man to run away.

General Manager, Elmer S. Smith, and the Denver office manager, Mr. Thompson, are positive that the thief will not be allowed to leave the state, while they are engaged in their efforts to apprehend him.

The proposition to grant permission to Alan C. Larson to see the waters flowing from the Salt Lake canal, as the power plant, came up before the Committee on Irrigation and Municipal laws last night, and after considerable discussion was voted down.
