"Jackling's connection with the im-mense low-grade porphyritic deposits of Bingham canyon, now owned by the Utah Copper company, dates back about 12 years, but it was not until he had returned from the north that he made any determined effort to solve the question of reduction upon an economical scale. In 1898 he inter-ested Capt. De Lamar in the project and extensive developments were unested Capt. De Lamar in the project and extensive developments were un-dertaken. In 1899 he spent many months in making an exhaustiva re-port upon the character of the de-posits and incorporated a plan of re-duction which he thought would result duction which he thought would result in great profit. His backer about the same time was affilted with frigidity in the lower extremities and matters fell back into a state of masterful in-activity until the year 1903. Jackling then obtained an option upon control and, after many further delays, suc-ceeded in interesting Charles McNeill, of Colorado, Spencer Penrose of Phila-delphia, and a few others who were struck with the evident grasp of the situation. "And that was the beginning of Utah Copper. The erection of a 300-Utah Copper. The erection of a 300-ton experimental plant was com-menced at Copperton and its capacity was gradually increased to 800 tons within the next four years. The great plant at Garfield was commenced in September, 1905 and the first of its 12 500-ton sections were started in June, 1907. Since then the progress of the undertaking has been a matter of com-mon mining history and now, after a total expenditure of \$4,000,000, the company has entered the list of the great copper producers of the world and Ulah, with unanimous consent, has handed Jackling the copper crown which he now wears with such becoming modesty. Judge John A. Street, attorney for the Bingham Con-solidated, also participated in the consolidated, also participated in the con-

ference President Greaves and associates President Greaves and associates completed yesterday a general inspec-tion of the properties of the Bingham Consolidated in this state, the object of which was to thoroughly familiarize themselves with conditions and to gather such data as they could, not already in reports submitted recently by Captain MacVichle and Mr. Zelgler. That something will be done in the direction of placing the Bingham prop-erties on the active list again, there is not the slightest doubt, but just what the campaign will be, is yet somewhat of an uncertainty. OLD DOMINION COPPER.

OLD DOMINION COPPER. Boston, Oct. 2.—The News Bureau says: For the month of August the Old Dominion company earned \$\$5,000 net upon a production of 3,631,630 pounds of copper. This would indicate a cop-per cost of about 11 cents a pound, but during August the Old Dominion com-pany was charging out \$14.75 per ton for its coke. Beginning with Septem-ber it commenced the use of \$9 west-ern coke and it was figured that this would reduce its copper cost about 1½ cent per pound. The September pro-duction was low, 3,181,000 pounds, but the reduction in cost by reason of lower fuel charges made up for the reduce output and September earn-ings were about the same rate as

ings were about the same rate as August. From now on it is not un-reasonable to expect the Old Dominion to have a monthly output of about 3,-500,000 pounds and a copper cost of 10½ cents, which would give net earnings of about \$100,000 per month on 13½-
