## PIOCHE ORES TO COME TO SMELTER

United States Company Succeeds in Closing Up Several Contracts In Camp.

## MINES STILL OPEN THOUGH

Prince Consolidated, Ohio-Kentucky And Utah-Nevada Can Produce Very Large Tonnage.

That the mines of Pioche will soon be contributing their share towards keeping the furnaces of the Salt Lake valley smelters in operation is indicated by a letter received from Pioche today in which the information is conveyed that representatives of the United States Smelting, Refining & Mining company have closed up contracts with several Pioche mining companies for the output of their respective mines. The contracts are confined, however, to the smaller properties of the district, no arrangements having been made as yet with such companies as the Prince Consolidated, Ohio-Kentucky and Nevada Utah, which are capable of producing a very large tonnage. The camp of Pioche has been a great producer of precious metals, and various estimates of the production of the district have been all the way from \$400,000 to \$800,000. In the early days the cost of mining was far greater than today, while the mill methods—pan-amalgamation—were of a very crude nature, and it was not uncommon for the operators of that time to leave ore that carried 80 or 100 ounces of silver and from 30 to 40 per cent lead on the dump. Now, however, the conditions have changed, and the cost of handling the ore has been reduced to a nominal figure by modern methods, and, through the advent of the railroad, all ores may be handled at a profit far greater than during the early seventies.

## SALES OF IRON BLOSSOM.

This Tintic Stock Active During Today's Call on Exchange.

Iron Blossom occupied all absorbing attention on the mining exchange today and the stock participated freely in the day's transactions, the closing sale having been made at \$1.60 on a buyer. ## JACKLING HER TO HEINZE'S CROWN

How Utah Operator Is Classified By Writer on a Los Angeles Paper.

## STORY ABOUT UTAH COPPER

Its Origin and Progress—Figures Showing Immense Tonnage Of Copper Ore.

The Los Angeles Times has printed several interesting stories about Utah mines lately from the pen of Sidney Norman, mining editor of that paper, who visited Bingham recently. Not long ago Mr. Norman had something to say about Ohio Copper, but Utah Copper is the latest subject treated, and incidentally, General Manager Jackling is again crowned as a copper king. The State of Utah, which now ranks fourth among the copper-producing states and territories of the United States, and which gives splendid promise of forging even further to the front within the next few years, has gone into the copper-crowning business on its own account, and within the past year, offers to the world the claims of a new copper king, who, at the age of less than 39 years, is in control of a tonnage of the metal every year. This man, who has usurped the youthful Napoleon position hitherto occupied by Montana's spectacular candidate F. Augustus Heinze, is Jackling, the man who has nursed copper from its inception and now manages the complete, and one of the very largest, plants in the world. It was over ten years ago when, first met Jackling and he was then employed by the Montreal owners of the mine in Ferry county, Wash., in the erection of the immense reduction plant which didn't reduce and which still stands as a monument to the assiduous assiduity of some people who profess to know something about the business of mining. It was then remembered that this was Washington's big gold mine—its first, and I believe, its last—worked with some success by Patrick Clark and his associates, with more success, the failure of the mill was in no wise due to any lack of metallurgical knowledge on the part of Jackling, but it was due to him, and the subsequent fiasco much to the regret of Jackling, who had taken over the mine in Ferry county, Wash., and which still stands as a monument to the assiduous assiduity of some people who profess to know something about the business of mining.
