EVENING NEWS.

Thursday, November 20, 1879.

LOCAL AND OTHER MATTERS.

Remodeling.—The residence of Apostle Charles C. Rich, in the 17th Ward, is undergoing quite a change. A new two story addition is being erected at the rear of the old building.

Still Another.—Another man, suspected of complicity in the cattle stealing affair, was arrested last evening. His name is Hemingway, and it is alleged that he assisted Hunter to drive off the cattle from the pasture to Bingham.

Accident.—This morning, Mr. J. N. Pyper, employed at H. Dinwoodey's furniture store, accidentally fell through a trap door which had been left open, into the cellar. He was badly shaken but not hurt seriously.

Private Enterprise.—Mr. Zebulon Jacobs, conductor on the Utah Central Express train, is having the water pipes laid from the main on Second West Street, all the way up to his residence on West Temple Street, 17th Ward. The excavation will extend for a distance of over two furlongs. Mr. Jacobs' enterprise is commendable.

Correction.—Yesterday, in our notice of the departure of Elder John P. Sorenson to New Zealand on a mission, we made an error in speaking of him as part proprietor of the Valley House. The fact is, Mr. Sorenson was the past proprietor, but has not had anything to do with that hotel for some time. Mr. Andrew C. Brixen is the present sole proprietor.

Dangerous.—Yesterday morning a gentleman picked up a large piece of bi-chromate of potash at the rear of one of our mercantile houses. The piece is large enough to kill about a dozen persons, if eaten. It is of a very attractive color, and as a number of children are often in the vicinity referred to, greater care should be exercised by those who handle this deadly poison, that none of it be allowed to lay around so carelessly.

District Court.—Proceedings Thursday morning, Nov. 20th, 1879, Chief Justice Hunter presiding:

E. M. Townsend vs. W. H. Hooper et al.; findings settled and filed. Plaintiff excepts to refusal of findings. Thirty days allowed plaintiff to prepare for new trial.

Last chance S. M. Co. vs. Telegraph S. M. Co.; judgment restraining the defendants perpetually from conveying under certificate of sale.

The Reunion.—The soiree held last evening in the Conservatory Rooms, in honor of the anniversary of Mrs. Ferguson's Conservatory of Music, was a very enjoyable affair. Up to 10 o'clock, the time was pleasantly spent in listening to vocal and instrumental selections by the pupils of Dr. Ferguson, recitations, etc., interspersed with the enjoyment of lively and pleasant conversation. Ice cream and cake were then served by that prince of caterers, The Trumbo, from the popular confectionery of Mr. Arrogast. The reunion came to an end about 11 o'clock.

Mr. Stayner's Lecture.—"The Pulpit, the Press and the People, the Pyramids of Power," was given for the first time, in the 17th Ward, last evening, to a large audience. The time of delivery was 55 minutes, during which the assembly paid the most earnest attention. The speaker began by directing the minds of his listeners to the great Pyramids of the Upper Egypt, as symbols of the ideas he wished to convey and subjects from which he wished to derive inspiration for his task of presenting to his audience "the marvels of the present"—the social pyramids of power now in the midst of the earth. He then called attention to the first of the three grand factors—the pulpit; described its original purpose, its various uses for right and wrong, and the vast influence it had exerted on humanity from the earliest periods until now, and showed that the pulpit should always be inspired of God to enable it to accomplish its work in righteousness. The next branch of the subject was the Press, which went hand in hand with the Pulpit, as a pyramid of power. The lecturer dilated with eloquence on its noble capabilities and achievements, as well as its frequent perversion and consequent disgrace. As much as the pulpit needed inspiration, the press needed to be honest and upright, otherwise both would bring shame and contempt upon themselves and calamity to all who came under their influence. Last, but not least, "stands that noble architectural combination called the People." The growth of ages, the Samson of Society. Bound like him of old, for ages, with the chains of kingscraft and the withes of witchcraft, it had burst them one by one, and in the revolution of '76 had risen again in power and majesty. To-day, its locks of power were being shorn by the shears of political trickery and fraud, the eyes of its understanding put out, and the blind giant condemned to grid in the prison house of adversity. But the history of the Samson of old was not to be repeated entirely in the history of the Samson of to-day. God had marked out a higher destiny, which was gradually but certainly being fulfilled. The speaker then gave his views of society, its nature and its inner workings, and showed that the People was the greatest of all the Pyramids of Power, Intelligence was their great need, and they were fast acquiring it. Man should study to obtain knowledge, and assist others to do likewise, for it was knowledge that would elevate him to the presence of his Creator, one of whose greatest lessons to men was for them to love and assist one another. He also exhorted them to be charitable. To those who differed honestly in religious views, they should be lenient and patient, doing what could be done for their welfare, but leaving the result with God, who had prepared for every grade of intelligence in the glorious infinitudes of His kingdom.

We have given a hasty synopsis of this excellent lecture, but lack space to say more at present. To those who wish to learn more of it, we say go and hear Mr. Stayner when next he appears with his masterpiece in public. An expression of thanks was tendered to the speaker by a unanimous vote.

On the Rampage.—Yesterday afternoon, word was brought to the police station that an old man named Brunker, living in the 11th Ward, had gone crazy and was firing his gun around his premises, and acting in the most threatening manner toward the neighbors living near him. He had been prowling around for a day or two with a loaded weapon and had succeeded in thoroughly frightening the neighborhood. The officers, when they went to take him in charge, were told not to go in at the front door, as the insane man was inside and had been shooting through the door and threatening to kill any one who came in. The police, however, effected an entrance quietly and quickly, and found Brunker with his back turned and his gun leveled at the back door, as though expecting them from that direction. On seeing the officers, he swung around and had newly drawn a bead on them, when they sprang forward and secured him. He was taken to the City Hall and locked up. His gun had a seven inch charge in it. Brunker's wife was the only person in the room, besides himself, and she was so terrified that she was violently toward everyone else, he made no effort to harm her in the least.

Opium Den Raided.—At about 11 o'clock last night, the police effected an entrance into a Chinese opium den in the alley leading east from Commercial Street, and arrested three Chinamen whom they found therein. One of these was the proprietor, Ah Coon, the other two were his customers. This den is said to be the only one which white persons are permitted to visit, and a strenuous effort to break it up was therefore planned and executed. A lamp, some pipes, an opium box and other articles were taken. The keeper of another place, named Quan Lung, and another Chinese inmate were also taken into custody, with their utensils. No white persons were found in either place. Two of the Mongolians gave bail for their appearance to-day, but the others remained in Jeff over night.

This afternoon the five Chinamen were before Alderman Spier, who occupies Justice Pyper's seat during the latter's absence, and by their attorney, J. D. Lomax, claimed their right to a jury trial. The case was accordingly continued until to-morrow, at 10 a.m., the counsel for the defendants announcing his intention to move, at that time, for a dismissal of the suit, on the ground of a lack of jurisdiction.
