## A GOOD COUNTRY.

ROCK CREEK, Oneida Co., Idaho,  
February 19th, 1885.

Editor Deseret News:

As this portion of country is but little known abroad, I write a few lines concerning it. Our valley is about 20 miles in length and averages one mile in width. The soil is a dark sandy loam. We can raise any kind of vegetables, and I believe we can compete successfully with any country in raising small grain, corn not excepted. We have sufficient water, too, for all the land that can be cultivated. And as for grazing facilities, the vast summer and winter range in this vicinity is the best the Territory affords.

The low mountains abound with white and red pine timber, and we have a small saw mill in operation, which is doing good work and will average 1,000 feet per day. We also have an abundance of small cedars, on the low hills and swamp cedars large enough for saw timber.

We are greatly in need of a grist mill, but there is a good location for one here, and there is plenty of grain raised in the vicinity to supply a mill the year round. A grist mill could easily be run all the year round, too, for the water never freezes.

It is about fifteen miles to a good market.

About 70 families are located in this valley at present, and more are coming. The people enjoy the best of health, and about three-fourths of them are Latter-day Saints, who are trying to live their religion.

We have a good day school in operation, and our Sabbath meetings, Sunday school and Young Men's and Young Ladies' Improvement Associations are well attended.

We are organized in a Ward, under the supervision of Bishop Isaac Thorn, and although we are deprived of most of our rights and privileges as American citizens, we are determined to serve God and live in peace with each other.

Our mail is very irregular at present, but we will soon be relieved of this inconvenience, for we are going to have a post office established here soon, which will be a great benefit to the people.
