We have a good day school in operation, and our Sabbath meetings, Sunday school and Young Mens' and Young Ladies' Improvement Associations are

well attended.

We are organized in a Ward, under the supervision of Bishop Isaac Thorn, and although we are deprived of most of our rights and privileges as American citizens, we are determined to serve God and live in peace with each other.

Our mail is very irregular at present, but we will soon be relieved of this inconvenience, for we are going to have a post office established here soon, which will be a great benefit to the people.


