It is believed that Galveston is being strongly fortified in anticipation of an attack.

The report that A. H. Stevens had gone to Europe is unfounded.

The statement in rebel papers that Burnside had retreated from Jonesboro to Nashville is not true.

A special to the Herald says all necessary provisions have been made to meet demands on the treasury, at least throughout the present month, without another loan.

The Commercial's advices from Chattanooga, Saturday last, state that it is estimated at head quarters that our losses in the battles at Chickamauga, (known as the Chattanooga battles) were 1800 killed 9500 wounded, and 2500 taken prisoners; total 13,800.

The President has issued a proclamation inviting his fellow-citizens in every part of the United States, also those who are at sea and those sojourning in foreign lands, to set apart and observe the last Thursday in November next, as a day of thanksgiving and prayer.

The formation of the State government in Virginia is now complete; the capital will be temporarily established at Alexandria.
