

SAMUEL NEWHOUSE IS CHIEF BOOSTER
Gives Commercial Club Site for Fine New Club Home.
IMPOSES ONE CONDITION.

That Salt Lake will soon be in possession of a business club structure commensurate with her dignity as a commercial center, was asserted at the meeting of the Commercial Club at the home of Samuel Newhouse, donated at the site of the proposed building at the corner of Cactus street and Exchange place, valued at \$100,000.

The site is 15 feet in dimensions and is to be the corner of Cactus street and Exchange place; that is, at the corner half a block east of the Commercial club, and south Main, and house building on Cactus street and north facing east on Exchange place. When Mr. Newhouse purchased the ground, he gave \$100,000 for it; but since the building is to be a business club, the value of the site is now worth fully \$100,000. The big skyscrapers in the city are the value of surrounding ground. The Commercial club, and the building to be erected on the site, will be a handsome structure, and will be a landmark in the city. SUBSCRIBE FOR BONDS.
The gift of the site becomes more effective when the club has funds guaranteed to begin building operations. The first matter of business following the announcement of the gift of the site, was to consider ways and means for raising funds with which to build. Somebody suggested that building bonds be issued to the amount of \$200,000, and that the subscriptions be started at once. The plan was suggested and before the close of the meeting, as announced above, \$56,500 had been pledged for the building. HARMONY IN CONSTRUCTION.

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GERTRUDE REEVES HELD FOR MURDER

Colored Woman Charged With Killing Her Infant Must Stand Trial.

DIEHL'S PECULIAR DECISION.

Judge Says He Believes the Woman Not Guilty and Would Admit Bail If Possible.

Gertrude Reeves, the colored woman charged with murdering her baby boy within a few hours after its birth, by choking it to death on Feb. 23, must face the district court on the charge of murder in the first degree.

Such was the decision of Judge C. B. Diehl of the criminal division of the city court this morning, when the case was called for final settlement in preliminary hearing.

It is charged by the state that Mrs. Reeves choked to death her recently born baby boy, to conceal from her husband the fact that he was not the father of the child. The prosecution was handled by Asst. County Atty. Farnsworth, and Atty. Sam King represented the defense. The legal conflict was hotly waged throughout the hearing, considerable expert testimony being introduced on both sides.

In rendering his decision this morning, Judge Diehl said in part: "If I were to say whether the defendant was guilty or not of murder, I could not find her guilty. But I believe that a crime was committed and that there is probable cause to believe the defendant guilty thereof. As I have said, if it were a question for me to decide as to guilt or innocence, I should say not guilty. I would admit the woman to bail if I had the power, but that is a matter that will have to go to the district."

CIVIL SERVICE EXAMS

Government Wants Magnetic Observer, Custodian of Archives and Chemist.

There will be civil service examinations in this city, April 29, for magnetic observer, coast and geodetic survey, salaries, \$60 to \$100 per month. In the prosecution of the general magnetic survey of the United States and outlying territories, it will be necessary at times, and especially during the summer months, to employ temporarily and for short periods a number of men of the requisite scientific training. Applicants must, therefore, state distinctly in their applications their periods of availability. The time when and the place where such persons are to be employed can not be definitely stated. Persons are desired who have had experience in a university or college as professor, assistant professor, teacher, or tutor in physics or allied sciences; or persons who have taken post-graduate degrees in physics or allied sciences; or students who have had not less than two years' work in physics or allied sciences, including laboratory practice.

There will be an examination, same date, for custodian of archives, hydrographic office, navy department, at \$1,200 per annum.
The duties of the position require the appointee to have a knowledge of library economy, such as is taught by the leading library schools. This knowledge should relate not only to the care of books, but also to cataloging and indexing. While not a requisite, familiarity with the public documents or publications of the United States and of the indexes to them will be valuable.

Civil service examination for junior chemist, geological survey, will be held May 6, salary \$1,020 to \$1,380 per annum; also for laboratory assistant in wood chemistry, forest service, department of agriculture, at \$900 per annum, men only admitted; also, for junior engineer, geological survey, salary \$1,020 to \$1,380 per annum; also for foreman, engine class, coast and geodetic survey, at \$1,115 per month. The department states that the appointees to the specific positions mentioned will, upon their arrival at Manila, be promoted to the position of chief engineer, first class, at \$140 per month. Also for field assistant in biologic investigation.

Unmarried men are preferred for this work.

HELEN PIERCE GRAY GIVES SPICY TESTIMONY

Washington, April 1.—Mrs. Helen Pierce Gray, a newspaper woman, who was arrested last summer on the Crow Indian reservation in Montana and kept in jail for three months on a charge of collecting money from the Indians, was given a hearing today before the senate committee on Indian affairs. She denied that she had collected more money than was necessary to pay her expenses to Washington, where she came to make representations relative to injustices which she claimed had been done the Indians. She charged Secretary Garfield and Commissioner Leupp with misconduct in office and declared that Major Reynolds, the Crow agent had been guilty of gross favoritism in leasing the Indian lands. She also asserted that Mr. Leupp had been partial to the Littleton township company. Mr. Leupp was present and denied having any financial interest in that company.
