When Mr. Newhouse purchased the ground, he gave \$50,000 for it; but since the beginning of work on the big skyscrapers in that vicinity and the consequent increase in the value of surrounding property, it is now worth fully \$100,000. Henry Ives Cobb, architect of the Newhouse and Boston buildings, was present at the meeting, which was really in the nature of a luncheon given in the private dining room of the Commercial club, and submitted a set of plans for the new building. According to the plans prepared, the building will be six stories high, and when completed, will cost \$200,000, in the liberality and rogressiveness of the business men of Salt Lake.


