BAD MAN KILLED IN DESPERATE FIGHT.

Tonopah, Nev., Aug. 20 .- News was brought in here tonight from Arwood, in the Fairplay district, of a sanguinary ncounter between a sheriff's posse and a number of hard characters. Then La-feur entered and defied the officers to arrest him. Emerson knocked him to his knees with a leather billy. He arose and rushing on the deputy, stabbed him under the shoulder. Emerson grabbed the hand that held the knife and Barrows grappled with Emerson. Clark broke Barrows' hold and Wieland knocked him down. Lafleur had brok-en loose in the struggle and rushed at Emerson again with uplifted knife. Emerson by this time had drawn a 45-automatic colt and met the bad man half way with bullets. Lafleur dropped in his tracks and expired in a few min-utes. The crowd broke and ran, but Barrows was subsequently captured.
