CONGRESSIONAL.

SENATE.

WASHINGTON, 2. Mitchell introduced a bill to amend the act granting a portion of the United States military reservation at Salt Lake City for cemetery purposes; referred to the committee on military affairs.

WASHINGTON, 3.

After the morning hour Morton, from the elections committee, reported that Turner, manager of the Western Union telegraph office at Jacksonville, Oregon, had refused to answer certain questions, claiming that he could not divulge the company's business. A resolution, declaring that Turner is in duty bound to answer the questions and cannot refuse to for the reason given; ordered printed.

WASHINGTON, 5.—Morton called up the resolution of the election committee, declaring that Wm. Turner is bound, under his oath, to answer the questions of the committee regarding the transmission of telegrams through his office at Jacksonville, Oregon, etc.

Kelly argued there was no reason why the telegrams should not be public when justice required. It was a well known principle of law that written communications, however confidential, must be produced in courts when necessary to serve the ends of justice. Turner had undoubtedly disclosed part of what passed through his office and must now tell the whole. He was very sure that nothing wrong had passed over the wire. If any improper telegram had gone that way he would have known it. He was satisfied not one dollar had been expended improperly.

The question was discussed at length and finally a vote was taken which resulted—yeas 33, nays 3. A resolution recently presented by the elections committee requiring Turner, the Western Union Telegraph manager at Jacksonville, Oregon, to answer questions concerning certain telegrams which went through his office, etc., passed—35 to 3.

HOUSE.

WASHINGTON, 3.—Barnes, the Western Union Telegraph manager at New Orleans, was brought before the bar of the House as a recalcitrant witness this morning, but the hearing was postponed till Friday at the request of Crounse, and Barnes was recommitted.

The Speaker appointed McDell on the committee on the rights, duties and privileges of the House in the electoral count, vice Monroe excused.

WASHINGTON, 4.

The House then considered the bill fixing the compensation of United States marshals and deputies. Conger's amendment, striking out the clause limiting deputies, salaries to \$1,200 per year was defeated, and the bill passed.

A bill passed making Galveston and Brownville ports of entry. Goodin, from the public lands committee, reported back the bill concerning the proofs required in homestead entries. The Senate amendments were concurred in.

Kidder, from the same committee reported back the bill giving the contestant parties time to enter lands under the pre-emption, homestead or timber culture acts, after the contest has been finally decided; passed.

WASHINGTON, 4.—The bill granting pensions to soldiers and sailors of the Mexican, Florida and Black Hawk wars was passed. It allows pensions of \$8 a month to all who served sixty days in the Mexican war or thirty days in the Florida or Black Hawk war.

WASHINGTON, 6.—Howe reported a bill for the sale of desert lands in California, Oregon, Nevada and the Territories. It provides for the filing of a declaration with the register and receiver of the land district in which the desert lands are situated, that the person intends to reclaim a tract of desert land, not exceeding one section, by conducting the water upon the same within a period of three years thereafter, and upon subsequent proof of such reclamation and payment of \$1.25 an acre for such tract, a patent therefor shall be issued. All land, mineral and timber lands excluded, that will not, without irrigation, produce some agricultural crop, are to be deemed desert lands. The bill was passed.

Goodwin reported a bill to authorize the city of Cheyenne to enter and purchase certain public lands within its limits, passed.

Douglass, chairman of the Freedman's Bank Committee, reported a bill authorizing the sale of the property of the bank under foreclosure, when it is for the interest of the bank to do so. He explained that this bill was to remove doubts as to the propriety of the commissioners bidding in the property which was offered at auction, and about to be sold at a sacrifice. The bill was passed.

WASHINGTON, 5.—The Senate amendments to the invalid pension appropriation bill were concurred in.
