

MOTHER'S LAMENT FOR HER DEAD BOY

Mrs. Harris Admits That Man Who Robbed Highland Park Bank Was Her Son.

DIED BEFORE HE LEFT HOME

For the Terrible Victories That Atrocity Has Won Over Mankind, This Is the Most Pitiful."

Los Angeles, Oct. 15.—Mrs. Will Harris admitted late last night that the man who killed himself Wednesday after robbing a bank in Highland Park, Ill., was in all probability her son, Lamar Harris, a former attorney of this city. Mrs. Harris based her conclusion on the description of the robber telegraphed by the Chicago police.

This description mentioned the scars under the chin and shattered the mother's last hope. These scars were from a surgical operation during childhood.

Since the Chicago dispatches carried the story that the robber was Lamar Harris, his mother, now young and feeble, has been arrested. The wife is said to be dangerously ill.

Harris left last night made this statement:

"In the face of all the evidence and what are apparently positive proofs, the family is forced to relinquish all hope that other than my immediate son who committed suicide in Chicago. I consider that Lamar died in reality long before he ran away from this city and that which is said in Chicago is the mere shell of me, and that it was once a brilliant boy, namely me."

"The terrible victories that atrocity has won over mankind, this is perhaps the most pitiful and awful of them all."

Harris was 30 years of age. He was a graduate of the University of Mississippi. After his graduation he remained at Starkville as a member of the faculty and there married. Remaining here several years ago, he became associated with the firm of Barron, William A. Harris. The same man built up a practice that yielded an income of \$15,000. It was too successful with all family ties to enter upon the pursue stage and after the arrival of his wife and still younger than that brought the peculiar climax of Wednesday.

PHYSICALLY IDENTIFIED.

Chicago, Oct. 15.—The body of the Highland Park bank robber was positively identified today by Miss Mary Harrington, an actress, as that of Lamar Harris, the Los Angeles lawyer and orator. Miss Harrington and Harris were much together at Los Angeles, Salt Lake City, Ogden and Cheyenne.

Miss Harrington betrayed no nervousness as she viewed the dead body.

Chief of Police Sheehan of Highland Park today received the following telegram from Philadelphia:

"Body for identification. Am on my way."

Ella Collyer of Kansas City, who knew Harris well, is expected here today to act for Harris's mother, Mrs. Will A. Harris of Los Angeles.

PHYSICIANS NOT ALLOWED
