ALDRICH PROPOSES INCREASES. The senate today having taken up schedules of the tariff bill formerly passed over, Mr. Akirich proposed a committee amendment increasing the duty on harness, saddlery, etc., from 35 per cent ad valorem, as provided by the house, to 40 per cent, which, he said, was still below the rate of he said, was still below the rate of the Dingley law. The increase was pro-posed in view of the senate's action in placing hides on the dutiable list. Reverting to the metal schedule, Mr. Aidrich proposed the committee's amendment increasing the duty on wrought and sorap iron, etc., from 10 cents a ton, as provided by the house, to \$2.50 a ton, to correspond to the duty on pig iron. The plan imposes a tax of 2 per cent upon the net carnings of every corpora-tion, joint stock company or associa-tion organized for profit and having a capital stock represented by shares, and every insurance company, organiz-

EXEMPTIONS.

Every latitude is given to concerns for exemption of expenses, cost of maintenance, depression of property debts and the interest thereon, other forms of taxation, and all expendi-tures usually taken from carnings ac-counts. Every corporation is also Fiven an exemption of \$5,000 of earny

tures usually taken from carnings ac-counts. Every corporation is also given an exemption of \$5,000 of earn-ings before the tax shall apply. All machinery relating to the col-lection, remission and retund of inter-nal revenue taxes, is made applicable to the corporation tax, and the respon-sibility for the enforcement of the proposed law rests in the same man-ner as other internal taxes. While the corporations are required to supply intimate information relat-ing to their business, provision is made to safeguard them against wrongful use of data obtained for the purpose of assessing the tax. Penalties are provided in cases of false or fraudulent provided in cases of false or fraudulent returns. Practically every character of incor-

fractically every character of incor-porated institution organized for pro-fit is brought within the provisions of the law. The provision defining the concerns from which the tax will be collected follows:

CONCERNS AFFECTED.

"That every corporation, joint stock company or association, organized for profit and having a capital stock repre-sented by shares, and every insurance company, now or hereafter organized under the laws of the United States or of any state or territory of the United of any state or territory of the United States, or under the acts of Congress applicable to Alaska or the district of Columbia, or organized under the laws Columbia, or organized under the laws of any foreign country, or in Alaska or in the District of Columbia, shall be subject to pay annually a special tax with respect to the carrying on or do-ing business by such corporation, joint stock company, association or insur-ance company, equivalent to 2 per centum upon the entire net income, over and above \$5,000, received by it from all sources during such year, ex-clusive of amounts received by it as

Every concern subject to the tax is required, on or before March 1 of each year, to make a true and accurate re-turn, under eath or affirmation of its president, vice president or other prinei-pal officer, and its treasurer or asso-clate freasurer, covering the character of its organization and the amount of business transacted during the year, to the collector of internal revenues, for the district in which the corpora-tion is organizaci; or in the case of for-eign corporations, stock companies or insurance companies, in the place where its principal business is carried on with the United States. the United States, "The return must, however, set forth: "(1) Total amount of paid-up capi-

"(1) Total amount of paid-up capi-tal stock outstanding at the close of the year; (2) total bonded and other-indebtedness; (3) gross amount of in-come during the year from all sources, and if organized under the laws of a foreign country, the gross amount of its income, derived from business transacted and capital invested within the United States; (4) amount re-ceived by way of dividends upon stock of other corporations or con-cerns subject to the tax; (5) total or-dinary and necessary expenses actually paid out of earnings in the maintendinary and necessary expenses actually paid out of earnings in the mainten-ance and operation of the business and properties, and in the case of for-eign companies, the cost of operation in conducting business transacted within the United States; (6) total losses actually sustained during the year and not compensated by insur-ance or otherwise, stating separately any amounts allowed for depreciation of property; and in the case of insur-ance companies the sum required by law to be carried to premium reserve law to be carried to premium reserve fund, and in the case of a concern or-ganized under the laws of a foreign country, all losses actually sustained by it in business conducted within the Ukied States act accounted within

COLLECTORS DUTY.

COLLECTORS' DUTY. Local collectors will transmit the re-turns forthwith to the commissioner of internal revenue in Washington. "Upon evidence justifying the opin-ion that the return is correct, or that whenever insufficient or no return has been made, the commission is em-powered to designate any regularly ap-pointed revenue agent to examine the books or papers of such corporations in order to produce the information required, for the purpose of assessing the tax. The commissioner is author-ized also to invoke the aid of any United States court to require the at-tendance of such officers or employes and the production of books and pap-ers. Upon this information the com-missioner may amend any return or make a return where none has been made."

made." Returns are to be retained by the commissioner, who will assess the tax. In the event of any return being made with false or fraudulent intent, the commissioner is required to aid 100 per cent of such tax, and in cases of neglect or refusal to make return, or to verify the same, the commissioner is to add 50 per cent to the tax. When the neglect is occasioned by sickness or the absence of a responsible officer, of the corporation subject to the tax, the collector is allowed to extend the the collector is allowed to extend the time, not exceeding 30 days. Assess-ment made by the commissioner must be paid by the corporations before June of each year

BECOME PUBLIC RECORDS. After assessments have been made, the returns of corporations must be filed in the office of the commissioner of internal revenue, and they will then constitute public records and, as such, will be opened for inspection. The retaliatory provisions of the wood sup and print paper paragraphs of the word the tariff bill being referred to by Senator Clapp today, Mr. Aldrich in-dicated that the finance committee still had that matter under consideration and hoped to report a substitute that would prove satisfactory to all interests concerned.

Senator Brown offered two amend-ments, which have the effect of elimi-nating the automatic retallatory fea-tures of the committee amendments and of making retallation depend upon an advance of the committee the second secon an order of the president, allowing the rates of duty to remain as in the committee substitute. Mr Aldrich agreed to take up these substitutes for final action tomorrow.

In the interest of American shipping Senator Elkins today Introduced the following as an amendment to the

"On all goods, wares and merchan-dise imported on ships or vessels of the United States, there shall be allowed a reduction of

United States, there shall be allowed a reduction of 5 per cent in the duties prescribed by law, to be levied, col-lected and paid on such goods, wares and merchandise." An amendment was adopted provid-ing duties on oil cloth and linoleum, varving from 6 cents a square yard and 15 per cent ad valorem to 12 cents per square yard and 15 per cont ad valorem. Senator Penrose proposed an amend-ment placing a duty of half of one cent a gallon on crude oil.
