## LOCAL BRIEFS.

Talks on Plagues—N. B. Martin will lecture on homing pigeons next Thursday evening before the Utah Pigeon Club at 174 South State street.

Stork in Palmer Home—Word from Whipple Park, A. T. brings notice of a visit of the stork to the family of Captain G. H. Palmer of the Thirtieth Infantry, at Palmer and Allie Homer of this city.

Smallpox Cases—Two cases of smallpox were reported yesterday to the city board of health. The victims were Melvin Oliver, 12 years old, and Edward Oliver, 3 years old, brothers, who lived at 219 South Eleventh West street.

Child's Funeral—Brief but impressive were the funeral services over the remains of the late W. W. Child, who died Sunday afternoon. Rev. Elmer Goshen made a short address to the friends and relatives present. The pallbearers were C. E. Allen, Dr. J. M. Dyer, H. H. Hall, W. C. Staines, A. N. Dwyer and H. G. McMillan.

Hold Drainage Election—The citizens of Camp Lane are holding an election today to determine whether they will create a drainage district, to establish and maintain a drainage district. The election which is under the direction of the county commissioners is the first of its kind since the law was passed two years ago by the legislature providing for drainage systems.

Makes Cheerful Announcement—A man giving the name of John Smith, started back Sergeant Spears at police headquarters last night by walking into the station and calmly making the announcement that he thought he had smallpox. Sergeant Spears lost no time in ordering the man out of the place and into the middle of the street where he remained until Dr. H. Steele arrived and pronounced the case smallpox and ordered the man sent to the isolation hospital.

To Take Man Home—Charles R. Fleming, the man who was stricken so peculiarly at the First Presbyterian church a week ago last Sunday, and who started east on Saturday, got as far as Provo when he was overcome by his weakness. He was put on a train and placed in the county jail, from which place he will probably be brought to Salt Lake today. Arrangements have now been made to send him to Los Angeles, in care of Detective Chase. Instructions to the case have been received from a sister.

Is Caring for Children—As indicated in last evening's "News," there is nothing in the story told in a letter from Mrs. Daley Drivhaug to the police to the effect that her husband had kidnapped their four children while she was sick in bed at Denver, Brumback has been good and is taking good care of the children and declares that their mother deserted them. He lives at the corner of Twenty-first East and Tenth South and is a neighbor of James Devine, who says Brumback is a hard working man and is caring for children.
