HAWAIIAN FRANCHISES.

Att'y Gen. Has Not Directed that Suits be Brought to Annul Them.

Washington, Nov. 13 .- At the department of justice it is denied that Attor ney General Griggs has instructed U S. District Attorney Baird to institute suits in the federal court of Hawaii to set aside all grants, sales, franchises and leases in Hawaii granted since September 28, 1899. During the interim between the annexation of the islands and the passage of the Hawalian act of April 30, 1900, the attirney general rendered two opinions to the effect that under the Hawalian laws then in force, there was no power to sell franchises and public lands. By the terms of sec-tion 73 of this act the ratification of such grants and sales during the hiatus was subject to the approval of the Pres-Ident.
