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"Star"-Light.

The following items are from the *Millennial Star* of November 20:
Elder High Priest is appointed a traveling Elder in the District, to labor, in the meantime, in the more northern counties of Scotland.

William England is appointed a traveling Elder in the Birmingham Conference.

Elder Joseph B. Elder is appointed a traveling Elder in the Rock Conference.

The address is wanted of Samuel Jackson and general mechanical work, in the early part of 1881, for Utah. He was at that time about eight years old. It is believed that the name of his grandfather, on his mother's side, was John Hoyle, and that at that time he kept a store in the Valley. John Spedding, Chamberlain, Stockport, has information for Samuel Alcock that will lead to the latter's pecuniary advantage.

We are about to publish a new edition of **Spencer's Letters**, which was last published by the Church. The first was written from the press on the 20th inst., and we hope soon to have it completed and on sale. The edition now in process of publication will be printed in clear type, on an extra quality of paper, with binding to match, it being our intention that its execution and general mechanical appearance will be in unison with the superior quality of its contents.

On Saturday, November 16th, and several subsequent days, the ancient City of Norwich presented a scene of desolation and distress, the like of which has not been witnessed from a similar cause in the same place for 110 years. An area of five miles of streets, thickly built, was inundated by a flood of water, to a varying depth, of from one to several feet. Factories and other places of business were stopped, and thousands of people were rendered homeless. The destitute had to be huddled in school rooms and other public buildings, and fed by the hands of charity. The cause of the disaster was a continuous and copious rain fall, and the consequent swelling and over flow of adjacent streams.

"Enquirer" Items.—The Utah Southern Railroad Company is erecting a warehouse in American Fork.

It is currently reported that an epidemic is raging among the hogs in Sanpete County. The hogs are seized with spasmodic trembling which lasts about 15 minutes, and life becomes extinct. Several cases have been reported in Provo.

Last Thursday, as Mr. William Harris, of Provo, was coming with his team down a steep road in the north fork of Provo Cañon, the brake bar broke, and the weight of the load forced his horses against the sharp ends of a load of wood on ahead. One of the horses was killed instantly, while the other from the injuries received, had to be shot.

The ladies of Payson have had a mass meeting also, and protested against the anti-polygamy crusade. That's right.

The Eagle Gate.—This old relic, which has stood for so many years, is at last being taken down; the city deeming its removal necessary to the safety of pedestrians, and to the convenience of teams that habitually go that way. The danger to passers by has been the liability of their being taken unaware, and run over by teams coming through the gate, which conceals them from sight until almost too late to avoid a collision.

The remainder of the old wall extending eastward, will probably also be lowered. In place of that which once fronted the Bee Hive House, a neat and substantial iron picket fence now greatly enhances the general appearance.
