WHITE TRAPS AND MOSULLANS.

Proceedings in Congress.—Benton
of Cincinnati's Positions—
Failures.

New York, Aug. 16.—A special
telegram from London says: Gov-

THE RUSSIAN BRIGADES.

London, Aug. 16.—Brigades were

Russia had broken out again and

put down. To-day a Russian general

held in readiness for instant service in
suppressing any disorder. In the
meantime the British government
had sent a despatch to the European
powers, stating that the military
should be given a very short notice before

the whole of them.

FRENCH, CAL., Aug. 16.—The labor

shops are gradually being replaced by
white men. A number of the traps
are being demolished by the Chinese
in looking for work, and attacking
the Chinese. The Chinese are
driven out, they return to all the
places left vacant.

Wyoming, to meet at St. Louis on Tuesday, October
1, 1860.

CONGRESS.

On the Wilson Bill Discre-

New York, Aug. 16.—Little news
is available about the affairs of the
Northern Pacific Railroad company.
All the time the lawyers for the
receivers and the company were in
consultation at the offices of the latter.
The application for the appointment
of receivers, it is learned, has been
granted in St. Paul, Portland, Hobart,
Milwaukee, and New York.
