IABOR ORGANIZER HERE.
Grant Hamilton, Man Who Settled Goldfield Strike in Salt Lake.
Grant Hamilton, organizer for the American Federation of Labor, through whose instrumentality the labor strike at Goldfield was byken, and on the July 22.

hose instrumentality the labor strik at Goldfield was broken, and one of the most prominent labor men in the coun-try, arrived at Salt Lake Wednesday from Bolse. Mr. Hamilton has for 10 or 12 years been connected with the from Bolse. Mr. Hamilton has for 10 or 12 years been connected with the federation, prior to which time he was a printer in this city. He has made a success of his connection with the la-bor organization, and was selected as the most likely man to settle the diff-culties in the Nevada mining camp. Three weeks ago he left Goldfield with the victory for the federation perched on his banner, while the Industrial Workers of the World, who had caused all the trouble at Goldfield, and who had threatened Hamilton with anony-mous_letters bearing the skull and crossbones and warning him to get out of town at once under penalty of terri-ble punishment, and perhaps death, were compelled to back down and take their medicine of bitter defeat. ' Mr. Hamilton is now on his way to San Francisco to look into the labor troubles at that point, but expects to investigate the matter thoroughly be-fore attempting to assist in the adjust-men of the difficulties. He has been in attendance at the trial of Haywood in Idaho, not in any official capacity, but merely as an interested spectator. He denies any connection between the American Federation of Labor and the Western Federation of Miners. 'As a matter of fact.'' said Mr. Hamilton. The Industrial Workers of the World Mr. Hamilton characterized as having socialistic and anarchistic tendencies, and that all classes of men and women in Nevada belong to the organization. He is much pleased with his success in adjusting the difficulties at Goldfield, and hopes to be able to affect an amic-able settlement of the troubles among the laborers in San Francisco.
