A new invention for destroying fire damp in mines, the work of M. Delaunier, of Paris, has been laid before the French Academy of Sciences. It consists of a copper conductor, broken at intervals, but joined by very fine gold wire soldered to the copper; the gold wire being surrounded by bowers of sulphur which ignite easily. By passing strong currents of electricity through the copper wire, the gold wire becomes red hot, and thus ignites the sulphur, which burns any noxious gases that may be present. It will, of course, be understood that the electric current is made to pass through the apparatus before the descent of the miners into the mine. The Academy of Sciences have reported very favorably on Delaunier's invention.
