BACCALAUREATE SERMONS GIVEN.

Bishop Tuttle Speaks to the Rowland Hall Graduating Class Of 1904.

DR. PADEN TALKS TO ANOTHER.

Tells Collegiate Institute Graduates That "Well Regun is Half Done" -Westminster Tonight,

St. Mark's cathedral was filled to overflowing yesterday morning, on the occasion of the preaching of the annual baccalaurente sermon before the grad-uating class of Rowland Hall. The preacher was Bishop Daniel S. Tuttle, the presiding bishop of the Episcopal church in the United States. The preacher spoke from the text, "Now our Lord Jesus Christ himself, and God, even our Father, which hath loved us, and hath given us everlasting consolation and good hope through grace, comfort your hearts and stablish you in evevy good word and work," Thess. ii. 16-17.

The speaker explained in his introduction that the arrangement of the text went to show that Christ and the Father are to be taken as one, thus throwing light on the doctrine of Trin-ity, and the fact that Christ and the Ity, and the fact that Christ and the Father are one was understood by the Thessalonians. The various creeds do not teach the doing of good works. The church existed before the New Testament was written, and the fundamental doctrines were incorporated into the Bible, and not derived from it, as some have supposed. The speaker then said:

Does the fact that the creeds do no "Does the fact that the creeds do not inculeate duty, good living and so forth, prove that good works are of no value? God forbid, Faith and works run side by side in parallel lines, and both are binding upon Christians. The creeds contain the seed, the root, the foundation, from which are derived the flower, the tree, the superstructure of right living. Upon correct bases of faith and ng. Upon correct bases of faith and vorks are built up the happiest and ompletest Christian lives."

In addressing the graduating class of the Rowland hall pupils generally, Bishop Tuttle called attention feeling-ly to the recent death of Bishop Leon-ard, and then of the pleasure he took in addressing the young women before him. He referred to the dignity and influence of women, especially in the United States where woman stands on an equality with man. It is in neather countries where woman is denied her place and is made a slave and a plaything. After the benediction by the hishon many people trespect forward to thing. After the benediction by the bishop, many people pressed forward to shake hands with the gentieman. He left for Ogden later in the day to hold confirmation service at the Church of the Good Shepherd, returning today, in time for the exercises of this evening, in the First Congregational church. The members of the graduating class this year, at Rowland hall are Miss Nellie G. Calvin, Miss Mary C. Finley and Miss Jessie R. Kenyon. The pupils of the music department will give an exhibition this evening, in the First Congregational church, and the senior commencement takes place tomorrow evenmencement takes place tomorrow eveng, at the same place. Diplomas will he given Wednesday morning, in the cathedral by the bishop. The same evening, in the rooms of the ladies littrary, Bishop Tuttle will speak to the graduating class of nurses from St. Mark's hospital. The graduates are Misses Pauline Carroll Beebe, Kather-ine Louise Eager, Elizabeth Chester Hard, Phoebe Irene Marohn.

ANOTHER CLASS SERMON, "'Well begun is half done," A good beginning makes a good ending," quoth Hendyng," said Rev. Dr. Paden last evening, as he began his annual address before the graduating class and pupils of the Salt Lake Collegiate Institute, in the First Presbyterian church.

The speaker then continued: "As is the first fruit, so is the harvest. The young tree says by its fruitage: This is the kind of fruitage you may expect from me. The student says by his school work: That is the kind of a boy or girl I am that's the kind of work you have reason to expect from me." The speaker then continued.
