Philippine Trade Statistics.

Washington, Jan. 24 .- The Philippine trade statistics of the insular bureau of the war department show that the imports during the eight months ended August, 1903, aggregated \$22,266,580, and exports \$20,867,313. These figures are exclusive of coin and government sup-

The aggregate of exports and imports is an increase of almost \$6,000,000, over four-fifths of which may be credited to shipments from the archipelago, the hemp and copper output being especially large.

Ploting Against King Peter.

Vienna, Jan. 24 .- A telegram from Belgrade reports that Servians and Monteuegring living abroad are engaged vigorous agitation against Karageorgevitch dynasty, and have even planned a conspiracy against King Peter. Pamphlets have been distribut-ed in one of the Balkan states describing King Peter's active agitation against King Alexander and making serious charges against him. While the Servian government declines to consider this movement seriously, instructions have been issued to keep a sharp watch over Servian and Montenegrin emigrants. It is conjectured that this con-spiracy is the work either of Montenegrins or of the siters of the late Queen Draga.

A dispatch to the Neues Weiner Jourhal from Samiln, which is six miles from Belgrade, says that a number of drunken army officers belonging to the "murder party" recently made a demonstration in a restaurant at Belgrade sgainst the powers, during which por-traits of Emperor Francis Joseph and the czar were burned. The offending officers were court-martialed, but upon a special order from King Peter the proceedings were stopped. Against the

Mysterious Italian Murder.

New York, Jan. 25 .-- Another mystertous Italian murder has occurred here. The police entered the rooms of an Italian secret society in South Brook-lyn early today and found Zessetti Prono shot to death. Nothing could be learned as to the cause of the murder, as the members of the society had fied and word of the crime reached the po-lice too late to make any arrests.

After having filled im-portant positions on the Chicago Times he came to New York and successfully promoted several important railway projects.

PHILIPPINE CASES.

Supreme Court to Pass on Constitutional Questions.

San Francisco, Jan. 24.-L. R. Wils-ley, attorney-general of the Philippines, has arrived here, en route to Wash-ington, D. C., to argue several cases before the federal supreme court involving constitutional questions now pending on appeal from the supreme ourt of the islands.

The right of trial by jury in the Islands will be determined by one of them. The act of Congress giving civ-il government to the Philelppines does not contain the clause of the Constitution which guarantees the right of trial by jury.

The position of the government of the Philippines, which is to be represented by Atty.-Gen. Wilsley, is that the jury system can only be extended to the archipelago by an act of Congress. Gold Hunter. New York, Jan. 25 .-- Gen. William Chauncey Kibbe, an old Indian fighter and gold hunter in California during 1849, is dead at his home in Brooklyn from tuberculosis. He was in his

eighty-second year. Born in Illinois, Gen. Kibbe came as a young man to Brooklyn and secured a position as teacher in the public schools. In 1849 he had become a principal, but resigned to seek his fortune

in California. As a miner he was unfortunate and after a while he drifted into other pur-suits. He took part in suppressing many of the early Indian uprisings in California and Nevada and finally, when Leland Stanford became gover-nor, Gen. Kibbe became adjutant gen-

eral on his staff. After the Civil war Gen. Kibbe returned to Brooklyn and resumed teach-

Tokio, Jan. 25 .- Takashima, the Japanese interpreter for the Russian at-tache, was arrested on Saturday last on the suspicion of acting as a spy in the Yokosuka fortified zone. He has been taken to Yokohama for trial. It is alleged that conclusive evidence has been obtained regarding other suspects, which is causing a very strong feeling against such treachery, which is a cap-ital offense in Japan.

ULTIMATUM TO SCHWAB.

Bondholders' Protective Committee Lays Down the Law to Him

New York, Jan. 24.-Ramuel Untermeyer declined today to make public any reply on behalf of the bondholders protoctive committee of the United States Shipbuilding company to the plans of compromise proposed by Mr. Schwab and his associates. One of the bondholders who has been

prominently associated with the opposi-tion to the Schwab interests said no proposal offered by Mr. Schwab or the Schwab interests can be ilstened to or considered unless he agrees to these three things:

First-The invalidation of certain bonds Mr. Schwab now holds, amount-ing to about \$10,000,000.

Second-The election of a new board of directors, of which Mr. Schwab is not to have control for three years.

Third-Placing the trust on its feet by the issuance of \$3,000,000 bonds, ready money which would be needed, which Mr. Schwab wants to take at a 20 per discount, or at 80, but which he must take at par.

If Mr. Schwab cannot take up these three proposals, no compromise is pos-

Mr. Schwab has had this offer under consideration, or, at least, has heard of it, but he has made no answer to it.
