Louisville Promoter's Figures on Value of His Offering Are

It Shows That the Junk Heap, Called A steel Plant, Would Not Be Worth Freight Bill,

That it pays Salt Lake citizens, in their enthusiasm for a greater city, to remember the case of the copper plant, and investigate schemes offered to them, was amply demonstrated yesterday afternoon in a report made by Lon J. Haddock and Joseph A. Silver, on the Jones steel plant.

the wideness of eye necessary to a searching investigation, and for that reason when John E. Jones began first to tell in Salt Lake what a wonderful plant he had, he secured much atten-tion, but no hurses tion, but no buyers.

UTTERLY IMPOSSIBLE.

A trip to Louisville, Ky., was de-termined upon to be taken by Lon J. Haddock of the Manufacturers & Mer-chants' association, and by Jos. A. Silchants association, and by Jos. A. Sil-ver, who went as an expert on the price of machinery. Mr. Jones had appraised the plant at \$160,000, and when they delivered their report to the committee on industries of the Comcommittee on industries of the Com-mercial club yesterday at luncheon, they declared that the plant was really old, wern out scrap iron, of no particular value, and impossible as a basis for the value, and impossible as a basis for the kind of a steel plant Salt Lake needs. The quest for such a plant will not however, be allowed to lack, en account of the set back given by the examina-tion of the Jones plant. Instead the committees will continue at work and hope soon to bring here a plant that will be a credit to the city, to the state, and will do the work of the west in steel matters, which now is being done east of the mountains.

As the members of the industries committee of the Real Estate associa-As the helibers of the helibers of the helibers committee of the Real Estate associa-tion could not be present at yester-day's meeting to hear the report, a written report will be filed and kept on hand for future reference. The committeemen, they stated, had no trauble, in securing accurate data con-cerning the steel plant, as business men of Louisville were not backward in expressing their opinion after they found out that Jones had represented the plant to be two years old, when as a matter of fact it had been there for years and had passed into the hands of its present owner through a sheriff's sale; two years after it ceased to operate.
