## STEEL PLANT IS WHITE ELEPHANT

Louisville Promoter's Figures on Value of His Offering Are Badly Bumped.

### REPORT BY THE COMMITTEE

It Shows That the Junk Heap, Called A Steel Plant, Would Not Be Worth Freight Bill.

That it pays Salt Lake citizens, in their enthusiasm for a greater city, to remember the case of the copper plant, when amply demonstrated yesterday afternoon in a report made by Lon J. Haddock and Joseph A. Silver, on the Jones steel plant.

They found the selling of the plant to Salt Lake was a promotion scheme, that Jones was probably working for a commission, instead of acting as owner of the plant, that it consisted actually of a lot of scrap iron, hardly worth transporting here, that an alleged electric light plant on the grounds was actually composed of one broken down lamp, that the plant had been out of use for half a dozen years, and would in no way approach the figures given as its worth by the promoter.

In the case of the copper plant of former Salt Lake capitalists, they were induced to invest, a plant was bought on credit, then the promoters died, the Beresford Hope act, and the owners of the plant swooped down upon it and took it away.

The lesson it taught Salt Lake was to never let enthusiasm run away with judgment. It was necessary to a searching investigation, and for that reason when John E. Jones began first to tell in Salt Lake that a wonderful plant had been secured much attention, but no buyers.

UTTERLY IMPOSSIBLE. A trip to Louisville, Ky., was determined upon to be taken by Lon J. Haddock of the Manufacturers & Merchants' association, and by Jos. A. Silver, who went as an expert on the price of machinery. Mr. Jones had appraised the plant at \$100,000, and when they delivered their report to the committee on industries of the Commercial club yesterday at luncheon, they declared that the plant was really old, worn out scrap iron, of no particular value, and impossible as a basis for the kind of a steel plant Salt Lake needs.

However, he allowed to lack, on account of the set back given by the examination of the Jones steel plant, the committee will continue at work and hope soon to bring here a plant that will be a credit to the city, to the state, and will do the work of the west in steel, which now is being done east of the mountains.

MONEY WELL SPENT. As the members of the industries committee of the Real Estate association could not be present at yesterday's meeting, the report will be filed and kept on hand for future reference. The committee, they stated, had no trouble in getting the report, as business men of Louisville were not backward in expressing their opinion after the general meeting. Jones had represented the plant to be two years old, when as a matter of fact it had been there for years and had passed through a sheriff's sale, two years after it ceased to operate.

The general feeling among the Commercial club members is that the money the investigation cost was well spent, and forecasts a plan of procedure for other new things which may be offered by promoters, which some it is felt, are sure to turn out as represented, and well worth taking up.
