TEA FROM CHINA.-Chicago enterprise is often alluded to, as an evidence of the wide awake character of its citizens. Butters & Co., and suggested the opening of a direct trade in tea with China. The hint was seized, a small shipment was ordered and in due time the tea-fifty packages—came. Other shipments followed and have met with a ready sale. The direct importation of teas to Chicago is now growing rapidly. Then fifteen of these sizes are made up into a package and securely covered with matting, and in this style it is shipped.


