

FIVE PRISONERS ARRAIGNED TODAY

Men Charged With Various Offenses Appear Before Judge

ALL TAKE TIME TO BLEAD

**Albert Whitaker Alleged to Have At-
tempted to Shoot His Divorced Wife**

Five prisoners were up for arraignment before Judge Armstrong in the criminal division of the district court today. Each one was given until May 31 to plead to the charges against them. Albert Whitaker was arraigned on the charge of assault with intent to commit murder. It is charged that Whitaker, in a fit of jealousy, attempted to shoot his divorced wife, Susannah Whitaker, at Murray on April 4. He was passing her home and saw another man in her company so pulled a revolver and fired several shots at

William Rogers was arraigned on the charge of burglary. The information alleges that he burglarized the Leader cigar factory at 63 Commercial street.

Burglary is also the charge upon which Frank K. Hayden was arraigned. He is charged with burglarizing a store at 154 south West Temple street on the night of May 4. Johnson and Fowler were appointed as his attorneys.

George K. Thompson and Carl Jennings were arraigned upon the charge of housebreaking. The former is charged with breaking into a dive on Commercial street on April 24. Evans & Evans were appointed to defend him. The latter is charged with breaking

into the home of Mrs. Nellie C. Kirk at 229 west Second South street on April 17. The court appointed Atty. C. G. Gatrell to defend Jennings.
