State Board Canvasses the Returns from Various Counties.

KING'S PLURALITY IS 4,247.

Total Vote Cast 59,354-Certificate of Election Issued-Hamlin's Total Vote Was 627.

The belated returns from Rich county arrived late yesterday afternoon and the State canvassing board immediately began figuring up the result of the re-cent special election. No discrepancies were found, and the totals were count-ed as certified to by the canvassing

ed as certified to by the canvassing boards of the various countles. The result showed that 31,446 votes had been cast for Judge King, the Democratic candidate, and 27,199 for James T. Hammond, the Republican standard-bearer, making Judge King's plurarily 4,247. The Socialist candidate, ohn H. Hamlin, received 627 votes on

The total number of votes cast for The total humber of votes cast for congressman at the special election was 59,554, as against 67,805 at the gen-eral election in November, 1898, when the congressional race was between Roberts and Eldredge. There were 78 defective ballots. Three votes were cast for Roberts and one for "Hamon."

Ring's plurality over Hammond is 4,247, and his majority 3,616. D. C. Eichnor, chairman of the Re-publican committee for Salt Lake coun-ty, entered a formal protest against the counting the returns from this county, for the unrace he wald of saving a

Mr. Eelehnor stated that in making out the returns a number of the judges had reported all the votes cast for W. H.
