

JURY DECLARES CROWE NOT GUILTY.

Was Charged With Robbing E. A. Cudahy of \$25,000 Some Five Years Ago.

EDDIE CUDAHY KIDNAPPED.

He Was Only Released on the Payment of an Enormous Ransom.

Omaha, Feb. 16.—The jury in the trial of Pat Crowe, charged with robbing Edward A. Cudahy, the Omaha packer, of \$25,000 in connection with the kidnapping of the latter's son five years ago, this afternoon, after 15 hours' deliberation, brought in a verdict of not guilty.

The kidnapping of Eddie Cudahy, Dec. 19, 1900, and his release upon the payment by his father of \$25,000 ransom, created a great sensation and the search for the kidnappers was stimulated at the time by the offer of a reward of \$50,000 by Mr. Cudahy.

It was the belief of the authorities that Crowe and James Callahan were the guilty parties, but no trace of them could be found until about a year ago, when Callahan was arrested. He was identified by young Cudahy as one of his captors, but released on trial, as it could not be shown that he received any of the money and there was at that time no law making the kidnapping of a person over 10 years of age a crime. Last October Crowe was arrested in Butte, Mont., and was put on trial Feb. 7. There was no evidence to positively identify Crowe as one of the kidnappers.

IS ARRESTED AGAIN.

Council Bluffs, Ia., Feb. 16.—Pat Crowe is now a prisoner in the Iowa state jail here and will be arraigned tomorrow morning on the charge of street car robbery. Crowe declares he is confident of acquittal.

The indictment against him charges that he and Arthur Levi held up two motor cars on the Council Bluffs side of the Missouri river bridge on July 2, 1905, and secured \$60 from them. Crowe's bond has been fixed at \$1,500.

Levi was on trial today for a saloon hold-up committed a month subsequent to the street car robbery.

MAURICE L. CAPLAN MURDERED IN COLD BLOOD.

Denver, Feb. 16.—Maurice L. Caplan, proprietor of the Denver Auction company, who resides in the heart of the Capitol Hill residence district, was murdered in the dining room of his home tonight by a masked man, who entered for the purpose of robbing Caplan. Caplan was a game of cards with his wife, daughter and a friend. The holdup walked in unannounced and holding two revolvers at Caplan demanded his money. When Caplan emptied his pockets and his wife had turned over all the money she had, the robber ordered Caplan to give him the money he had received from today's business. Caplan reached under the table evidently for a stool to throw at the man, when the latter fired the bullet striking Caplan in the back, killing him instantly. The robber then backed out of the house and escaped.

MOROCCAN GUNBOAT FIRES ON FRENCH VESSEL

Oran, Algeria, Feb. 16.—The Echo d'Oran says that the French steamer Zenith left Oran Wednesday evening, going to Marseilles. On her arrival at that port she debarked five persons who visited Del Bief, the chief of the pretender's staff. Toward noon, perceiving the Moroccan gunboat Turkey, which had been anchored in the bay of Mellila, leaving port and coming in his direction, the captain of the Zenith went on board his steamer, hoisted the white flag and stemmed toward the Turkey, with the object of entering in conversation with her commander.

JOHN CONLEY REPRIEVED.

Santa Fe, N. M., Feb. 16.—Gov. Hagerman granted a reprieve for one week to John Conley, who was to have been hanged at Taos today for the murder of James Redington, in order to permit an examination of his mental condition. It is reported that Conley became a raving maniac when told that the governor had refused to commute his sentence. There is no telegraph line at Taos and a messenger carrying the reprieve rode thither last night from Embudo, 35 miles over a mountainous road.

NO PARDON FOR PETERS.

Denver, Feb. 16.—The state board of pardons today refused to grant a pardon for Charles O. Peters of West Dover, O., under sentence of death for the murder of Mrs. Amanda Youngblood several years ago. The application was based on the claim that Peters is insane, and was recommended by the trial judge. In case it was so proven, the board considered the application but a few moments and in secret session.

Two of Peters' friends were also convicted of participation in the crime and have suffered the death penalty. Peters is sentenced to hang in May.

WRECK ON GREAT NORTHERN.

Bellingham, Wash., Feb. 16.—The Great Northern passenger on the coast line, due here at 1 o'clock on the way to Vancouver, C. from Seattle, ran into an open switch at Mount Vernon about 11:30 this morning, derailing the locomotive, tender, express, baggage car and smoker. The line was blocked for many hours and the engine badly damaged. No one was seriously hurt.

J. W. ALEXANDER SERIOUSLY ILL.

New York, Feb. 16.—James W. Alexander, former president of the Equitable Life Insurance society, is seriously ill in his home, No. 4 East Sixty-fourth street.

Mr. Alexander underwent a surgical operation on Thursday afternoon, after being removed to his home from a sanatorium in Deerfield, Mass.

It is said that Mr. Alexander has been suffering from some chronic affection of the kidneys for some time. An operation had been necessary for a long time, but owing to Mr. Alexander's physical condition resulting from his long illness it was postponed as long as possible. The operation is said to have been successful.

The physicians have hope of the patient's recovery, despite his advanced age and weakened condition.

CONVICTED OF MURDER.

Bellingham, Wash., Feb. 16.—The jury in the superior court at Mount Vernon found L. D. Ferguson guilty of murder in the second degree for shooting William Patterson at Mount Vernon, Nov. 6, 1905. Ferguson's defense was insanity. He blamed Patterson with having been the cause of his domestic troubles.

WOMAN TORTURED THE CHILD.

Aledo, Ill., Feb. 16.—Judge Graves, in the circuit court today, granted a new trial in the celebrated case of Mrs. Archibald McKinney, convicted of extreme cruelty in an adopted orphan, Stella Gray. Mrs. McKinney was sentenced upon the ground of insanity. Mrs. McKinney tortured the child with pins and table forks and in other ways. The child, when her plight was discovered, had 200 wounds on her body.

THE EMPEROR GROWS LIBERAL.

Surprises German People by Permitting Caricatures of Himself to be Circulated.

ARE A FRENCH COLLECTION.

Ordered Ministry of Justice Not to Prosecute for Insult to His Majesty.

Berlin, Feb. 16.—The emperor has surprised the German people, and especially strict constructionists of the less majestic laws, by authorizing the circulation of a French collection of caricatures of himself which zealous customs officers on the French frontier had seized.

John Carteret is a collector of the caricatures of all countries, some of them American. He published a volume of reproductions of the most notable of the caricatures which he entitled "He." When Carteret learned that the reproductions would not be allowed to enter Germany he wrote to the emperor, quoting Frederick the Great's letter to Voltaire, saying he was the last person who would forbid caricatures of himself, as they gave so much pleasure to his friends. Carteret added that he trusted the emperor would follow the example of Frederick the Great and not that of Napoleon III, who sought to suppress all jokes in France. The emperor directed Finance Minister Rheinbaben to instruct the customs authorities to admit the work and ordered the ministry of justice not to prosecute for insulting his majesty.

It is recalled in this case that Frederick the Great while riding in a Berlin street observed a caricature of himself hanging from the upper story of a house and gave orders that it be lowered so that passers-by could see it better.

KILLED AT HIS POST.

Engineer Put Head Out of Cab to Get Mail and Struck Projection.

Binghamton, N. Y., Feb. 16.—Joseph Leslie, a locomotive engineer on the Susquehanna division of the Erie railroad, was found dead at his post today at Wellsburg. No damage was done because of the alertness of the train crew.

Leslie was engineer of a fast freight train and reached out of the cab at Corning to catch orders handed to him on a ring, when his head struck some projection and presumably he was instantly killed. Passing through Elmira his lifeless body hung out of the engine cab, the head striking semaphore and gates, blood being spilled all along the tracks.

The tower man at Elmira noticed something wrong from the fact that the freight was then running at the rate of a mile a minute and they cleared the track ahead.

The conductor made his way over the train and set the air brakes. The fireman was not aware of the death of the engineer until Wellsburg was reached, the engine being of the "Mother Hubbard" type.

U. S. MARSHAL ARRESTED.

Ben Daniels of Arizona, the Man, Says It is a Case of Blackmail.

Tucson, Ariz., Feb. 16.—A special to the Citizen from Nogales states that United States Marshal Ben Daniels was arrested today there by Sheriff Fowler of Santa Cruz county, on the charge of fraud. Hans Larson, the complainant, states that Daniels sold him a mile in the Harshaw district a year ago for \$300, and that when he went to do the assessment work James Harrison, supervisor of Santa Cruz county, claimed the property as his. Larson demanded the return of the money, which Daniels refused and arrest on the fraud charge followed. Daniels was a rough rider and friend of President Roosevelt. He was appointed marshal last fall but has not yet been confirmed by the senate.

Daniels says the case looks to him much like blackmail. Because his confirmation as marshal is still pending in the senate, he says he thinks those who caused his arrest supposed he could not afford to stand trial and would readily give up the \$300 demanded.

WENT TO WASHINGTON TO MARRY MISS ROOSEVELT.

Washington, Feb. 16.—Peter Carlsson, a Swede, who said his age was 44 years and his home was on North William street, New York City, was taken into custody at the White House tonight on a charge of insanity, and locked up.

Carlsson had been walking up and down the pavement and had tried the gate at the east entrance of the White House when a policeman asked him what he wanted.

He replied that he had come to Washington today and that he wanted to see Miss Alice Roosevelt, to whom he said he was engaged to be married.

Carlsson was well dressed, carried a satchel and had considerable money.
