With repeated sensational bursts of speed that brought the spectators to their feet cheering wildly and rooting for their favorite, the racers in the half-hour night six-day race at the Auditorium skating rink started the second season of the race last night. While the crowd was not as large as in the first, the kind of work was made up for in enthusiasm.

The racing that evening was faster than on the opening night. The contestants covered 10 miles and 2 laps during the half-hour running on the little wheels, and there was not a dull moment during the entire race. The fastest work of the evening was done by Skates of Salt Lake and "Banty" Green, the speedy Logan youngster, who has demonstrated his ability to hold his own with the fastest roller skater in Utah, after his exhibition of speed in a race which was freely predicted that he will beat Skates if they are ever lined up for a match race. The fastest mile made last night was the fourth which was won by Skates in 2:30. As was the case on Monday night when the race was first started, the Salt Lake team kept even with the Logan team until the last lap, when Skates won by a quarter of a lap.

The judges that night were inclined to be rather harsh on the racers and penalties were pronounced on all the racers, but after a more careful consideration of the situation, it was decided that the penalties should be waived.

There are four more nights to go and there is no telling what will happen. The Butte and Denver boys do not seem to worry much over their loss of distance and expect to make it even.

New York, April 7.—Marked police activity is noticeable since Gov. Hughes has made inquiries concerning the holding of a fight in New York. Following the raid Monday night on the Manhattan A. C. of Brooklyn, in which two boxers, their handlers, and the ring officials were arrested, the police have raided a night club in a cellar beneath a saloon in Seventh avenue. Three hundred men were assembled to witness three fights, but the police stormed the contest after two had been held and arrested the fighters, the referee and the timekeeper.

Last night's fight was well advertised as a "championship" on the part of a local pugilist. Tickets, according to the police, were sold for \$1.50 each, the proceeds to be divided equally only when the house was full. Four policemen succeeded in purchasing tickets and were among the crowd which gathered around the club.

When the third bout was about to start a policeman jumped into the ring. The crowd rushed to the door and beat their way out into the street.
