LOCAL BRIEFS.

Tim Higgins was arrested yesterday for keeping his saloon open on Sunday. Both front doors were wide open, and business was being run on the week-day plan when the officers interfered and closed him up.

Alfred Brown was arrested by Police Officer Scott Sager last night after a terrific struggle. The man is demented and was creating a disturbance in the eastern part of town. He is now in the county jail. Before the arrest could be made, bystanders had to assist the police officer.

Sheriff Emery yesterday arrested E. Skiffis of Bingham Junction on the charge of attempting to defraud his creditors. It is alleged that he recently purchased about \$200 worth of goods for his store, but he became so deeply in debt that he concealed the goods with intent to defraud his creditors.

Lloyd T. King has returned from an extended trip east, and states there is a tendency among eastern life insurance companies to consolidate, and thus save excessive commissions, fixed charges, and other administrative expenses. Mr. King says the yellow fever epidemic is hitting some of the companies hard, and they are considering the adoption of a \$1,000 limit on policies written in tropical and semi-tropical countries.

A burglar entered the home of Mr. and Mrs. George T. Brice last evening while they were absent from the house. Upon their return they discovered the man in the house, and Mrs. Brice gave the thief a battle for life. The burglar escaped, however, and no trace of him has been found up to this time. A small amount of money, a watch and chain and other jewelry were secured. Entrance was made by prying open a window with a "lumpy."

A white man tried to prevent a colored expressman from unloading his horse yesterday afternoon on east Second and South just off Main. For his consideration of the well-being of the animal he was politely rebuffed from head to foot. Bystanders were treated much the same on interfering with the colored man's business. Soldiers took a hand and quite a crowd gathered when Officers Carlson and Moore appeared and dispersed the crowd. The white man who started things could not be found, and no arrests were made.

Copies of the new Methodist Hymnal, over which committees from both the northern and southern branches of the Methodist churches have been working for a number of years, have been received in this city. The new book contains 117 hymns, 10 doxologies, 29 chants, and miscellaneous selections, including Kipling's "Recessional," and hymns by the late John Hay and Rev. Dr. Washington Gladden. The more attractive features of the old book have been retained, and the great poets and composers are well represented. The Hymnal contains also the common order of public worship, the ritual and the psalter, with readings for special days in the year.

YOUNG GIRL DEAD;
DOCTOR IN JAIL.

Former Is Miss Alice Ferguson
And Latter is the Notorious
Doctor Payne.

BETRAYAL ALSO IN THE TOLLS

Is Robert Lee Stephenson, Well Known
In Local Circles—Evidence Against
Payne Regarded Conclusive.

Dr. E. S. Payne is again in the toils. This time he is charged with responsibility for the death of Miss Alice Ferguson, the victim of a criminal assault, who in her attempt to conceal her shame went to this notorious physician to have an operation performed. Dr. Payne was arrested Saturday afternoon and is held at the jail without bonds. Robert Lee Stephenson is under arrest as the "man in the case." Stephenson was arrested about 11 o'clock last night. His bonds were fixed at \$2,000 which were furnished, Frank B. Stephens and Benner X. Smith being his sureties.

AN OLD OFFENDER.

Dr. Payne has been under this kind of a shadow before, about three years ago being charged with the death of Miss Anna Hill, a Salt Lake school teacher. This case being incomplete in a technical way was dismissed. According to the information in the hands of the police, the girl was the victim of a criminal assault, who met death as a result of criminal practice. Blood poisoning followed and was the direct cause of her death. Three operations were performed, the last one taking place Thursday. After this operation she walked home. Friday night she died.

BEHIND THE BARS.

The police officers acting with the county attorney did quick work and Saturday afternoon Dr. Payne was behind the bars. He absolutely refused to discuss the matter with the officers. He was visited by his wife and daughter and by Judge Powers in the evening. They were together for a long time, but Judge Powers would not at that time say whether he had consented to take the case.

AUTOPSY PERFORMED.

An autopsy was performed by Drs. O'Connell, Fisher, Van Cuyt and Anderson, who agreed that the death of the girl was caused by blood poisoning, resulting from a criminal operation. A further examination of the pathological and bacteriological standpoint will be made before the report of the physicians is completed.

ADMITS HIS GUILT.

Stephenson has admitted his crime. The charge to be placed against Payne is murder in the second degree, for which the penalty may be from five years to life imprisonment. In this case the officers feel confident that they will secure a conviction and that the criminal practice of Dr. Payne has come to an end.

AN HONORED STUDENT.

Miss Ferguson was a student, much loved and entirely trusted, at Rowland hall. In May, young Stephenson met her and caused her downfall. He himself has been well known, and was regarded as a popular young fellow in the social set in which he moved. Stephenson is very lame, being badly crippled, though able to get about with considerable celerity. His part of the tragic case is keenly felt by his relatives and friends.

AWAITING A HEARING.

Meanwhile Payne is in jail awaiting a preliminary hearing. This time it is firmly believed he cannot escape the consequences attaching to his misdeeds, which, according to members of the medical profession have been many and continuous. He appears to fully realize his predicament, too, and will talk to no one, not even the police. The newspaper men he dislikes as much as a dose of poison. He thinks they have already told the public too much about him and that they have had too much to do in forming public opinion against him.

Mrs. Antoinette B. Blackwell, Suffragist and Freighter in Salt Lake.

Mrs. Antoinette B. Blackwell of New Jersey is visiting in this city as the guest of her niece, Mrs. A. B. Kinney, while en route east from attendance on the National Suffrage convention at Portland, Me. Mrs. Blackwell is not only a woman's suffrage worker, but is a Unitarian preacher. She says women's suffrage is steadily gaining ground in the east where women are entering the trades and professions to a remarkable degree and the time must therefore come when they can enjoy the same political rights as men. But the machine bosses are afraid women are likely to interfere with the running of the machine, and eye askance the progress made in women's political advancement in the far west. However, Mrs. Blackwell does not believe women will aspire to hold office, and their efforts will be directed along benevolent lines. She was the first woman to be ordained as a minister of the Christian church, and for a number of years was a Congregational minister, but drifted into Unitarianism. She has not been in Salt Lake for 15 years.
