This now leaves open the question of the permanent location of the county seat, which will be fought out in the future. Fremont county, nominally Democratic, is holding its breath for the figures as they continue to roll in, indicating that Dubois' industrious labors give the county to the Republicans by 2,500.

Pocatello's Great Figures.
