CORBETT'S STORY.

Gives a Graphic Account of His First Two Fights.

One of the best stories Jim Corbett gets off in his vaudeville monologue relates to his initial fight in California. He says:

"Wnen I was about 15 years old I seeured a position in a bank in 'Frisco My father, a typical Irishman, was very proud of me because I worked in a bank, and he would tell his friends that he had a boy that 'worruked in a bank. Dad never got through telling people that I worked in a bank. I was then very fond of boxing. There was a lad named Carney who lived in our neigh-borhood. He, too, was fond of boxing, but we were rivals, and, after many disputes, agreed to settle our differences by fighting to a finish on the sand bar. The fact that we were gogoing to fight on Sunday morning spread around among the sports, who made up a large party and started where we were to battle. My father had a livery stable, over which was a big sign, which read; 'Patrick J. Corbett.' It happened that the sports all passed the stable that morning and naturally pointed to the sign as they went by and told each other that that was the place of the man whose son was to fight. This attracted the old gentle man's attention and he soon learned that I was to fight. He called me into his office and reprimanded me severely, adding: 'If ye foight, Jim, ye'll lose ver job at the bank and break my heart.' He almost cried and I concluded that I would call the fight off, and went

to Carney's house to tell him that would not fight. Well, his big brother answered the door bell, and, thinking thinking that I had come to get his brother, assured me that the fight would come off, and did not give me a chance to explain my mission, I lost my head and offered to fight his brother right away. "We fought and I won, and then I whipped the big brother. I went back to the stable and told the old man that I had seen Cainey, but did not tell him that we had fought. He praised me and again toli me that I had saved my job at the bank. But one of my friends told the old fellow that I had whipped both the Caineys. Upstairs he came on a run. 'Phyais this I hear of ye whipping both the Carneys?" said the old man. I admitted that I had and he called down to my mother and told her about it. 'Maybe I will lose my job at the bank now, dad.'
