There are twenty-five nephews, and nieces to inherit \$55,000 each under the will, while four other grandnieces and nephews receive \$6,550 each. On reading this statement I wrote to a friend who has several thousand photographs of Italian paintings and other works of art, and asked him if he happened to have one of this par-ticular picture. He replied that he had not, and that probably the only person who had was the owner, as the painting had been stored for years past in the storerooms of the national gal-lery in London. I knew, of course, that Mr. Morgan owned a very large Ma-donna by Raphael, for which he is sup-posed to have paid about the sum named in the above dispatch; and that this painting had hung for the past nine years, with other Raphaels, in one of the principal rooms of the national gallery in Trafalgar square, where I have often seen it. But I did not sus-pet-as I have since learned—that the belated cablegram referred to this fa-miliar painting. In view of the facts, the assertion that "It will remain in Italy" is mildly anusing. A more re-cent report that Morgan had bought a beautiful Greek bas-relief of Anthous, unearthed in Italy, was controdicted, as soon as heard.—An Idle Reader in Putnam's.
