

RUEF MAY MAKE BIG DISCLOSURES

He Contemplates Preparation of A Statement That Will Startle the Public.

IT WILL BE VERY SENSATIONAL

Says Present Investigation is for the Purpose of Seizing the Municipal Government of San Francisco.

San Francisco, March 22.—It was stated today at the prosecuting attorney's office that Patrick Calhoun, president of the United Railroads company, would, upon his arrival here from New York, be given an opportunity to appear before the grand jury in connection with that body's investigation of the alleged bribery of the board of supervisors in the matter of an overhead trolley franchise granted the United Railroads last May.

From the same source it was also learned that a number of secret indictments, which have not even been trusted to the secret file for fear that their contents might leak out, are now against one person, but are said to contain the names of several.

To the Associated Press, Abraham Ruef said today that he is considering the preparation of a statement to the public, and he declared that when he tells his story it will contain sensational disclosures made by him, and that he is not against one person, but are said to contain the names of several.

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It may be the irony of fate that the former residence of Mayor Schmitz, in which he resided when elected, and often entertained and dined Ruef, and where the mayor and the political boss had many of their political campaigns, may become Ruef's prison for some months. The present owner is attempting to rent it to Elmer Biggy as a place of residence for Ruef when he takes the latter away from the St. Francis hotel.

The true reason for the determination of the prosecution to take no immediate steps towards removing from office the supervisors was disclosed this afternoon. Dist. Atty. Langdon stated that in order to remove them it would be necessary to prove that they were guilty of some crime. This would compel the prosecution to bring forward all its evidence and thereby disclose its entire hand before the trials of those who are to be indicted. Asst. Dist. Atty. Hickey declared that the mayor, having the appointive power, could fill the vacancies created by the removal of the supervisors with men on whom the investigators had no hold. To overcome this obstacle it would be necessary first to remove the mayor, and this Hickey admitted, the prosecution was in no position to do. It was also developed that the district attorney's office would run counter of the same law that defeated the attempt of Ruef and Acting Mayor Gallagher last fall to remove Dist. Atty. Langdon and put Ruef in.

At charges of bribery against Ruef were today assigned by Presiding Judge Coffey to Judge Dunne's department of the superior court. They will be placed on the calendar tomorrow and arraignment set for some day early next week. To avoid possible conflict between the chief of police or sheriff and Judge Dunne, Ruef was to be taken to the court by the sheriff.

The same care and watchfulness that has marked the custody of Ruef will be exercised in guarding the jury against any possible outside influences when his trial begins. Instead of bailiff or the sheriff having charge of the jury, Dist. Atty. Langdon stated today that the jury will be placed in charge of Elmer W. J. Biggy. This is said to be the first time in the legal history of the United States that an elisor has been appointed by a court to apprehend a defendant and given such power to keep him in custody. Up to the present time the ordinary functions of an elisor have been perfunctory and his appointment was usually for the purpose of drawing, returning and taking charge of juries when the sheriff or other proper officers are disqualified.

The present appointment of an elisor extends only to the one charge of extortion, on which Ruef is on trial, and does not apply to the other indictments. In order to reappoint the elisor to take charge of Ruef during the trial of the other charges, it will be necessary for the prosecution to show again that the sheriff and other regular officers are disqualified.

The report that there is dissension among Ruef's attorneys seems to be borne out by the fact that they no longer confer with him together, but visit him singly.

Ruef was in much better spirits when seen this afternoon. He submits gracefully to the restraint placed upon him and expressed his appreciation of the courtesies extended to him by Elmer Biggy and his guards.

When told that Mayor Schmitz's former residence may become his temporary prison, Ruef jokingly said: "Why not take my house? I offer the elisor my home for the purpose."

GAMBLING HOUSE KEEPER KILLS COUNTY ATTORNEY.

Bert Worth, Tex., March 22.—Following a raid on a resort late today, County Atty. Jeff D. McLean was shot and killed, and Daniel P. Scott, a member of the raiding party, fatally wounded by William Thompson, proprietor of the place. Half an hour later Thompson was surrounded by a posse and captured after a desperate fight in which Thompson received wounds that probably will cause death within a few hours.

The bodies of the slain were witnessed by hundreds of men and women, including many members of the state legislature, here in attendance on the session. County Atty. McLean, heading a party of deputies, forced an entrance into the alleged gambling house, placed a number of men under arrest and loaded a van with tables and other paraphernalia. Thompson then killed McLean and fled. Dodging behind a billboard Thompson ambushed Scott shooting the deputy three times. Thompson stopped only long enough to discard his empty pistol, that carried by the flying deputy and then renewed his flight. He was located in the lumber yard by Patrolman Bell and Lloyd Thompson, by this time thoroughly disarmed, vigorously returned the fire of the officers. After being wounded, however, his capture was easy.

COMEDIAN BARNABE.

Veteran Actor Is Handed Checks for Thirteen Thousand Dollars.

Boston, March 22.—Henry Clay Barnabe, the veteran comedian who for years was head of the Bostonians, was handed checks for \$13,000 at the close of a benefit performance given in his honor at the Boston theater today. The receipts of the benefit were \$4,000. Friends subscribed \$9,000.

MARCH'S HOT DAY RECORD.

Washington, March 22.—According to the United States weather bureau today was the hottest March day ever experienced in Washington. The temperature reached its highest point at 4 o'clock this afternoon when the thermometer registered 50 degrees. The records of the weather bureau for the last 27 years show that the nearest approach to this mark was March 22, 1894, when the thermometer registered 48 degrees. The temperature went up to points from 5 o'clock in the morning, when it registered 40 points above zero, until 4 o'clock in the afternoon, when the record-breaking mark was reached.

The official records received tonight show that the Ohio valley was also only other section affected by the hot wave. The official forecast predicts cooler weather by tomorrow night.

Pittsburgh, March 22.—The mercury registered today in this city today, the highest March day ever experienced in Washington. The temperature reached its highest point at 4 o'clock this afternoon when the thermometer registered 50 degrees.

Detroit, Mich., March 22.—This was the warmest March day in the history of the local weather bureau. The thermometer reached 50 degrees.

Kansas City, Mo., March 22.—The maximum temperature here today was 50 degrees.

Cleveland, O., March 22.—The temperature today reached a maximum of 50 degrees.

TELEPHONED THOUSAND JEWS HOMELESS

Situation in Northern Moldavia is Very Serious. Dead and Wounded Being Numerous.

OUTBREAK REALLY AGRARIAN.

Peasants are in Revolt Against the Farming Trust—Roumanian Government Thoroughly Aroused.

Vienna, March 22.—The seriousness of the situation in northern Moldavia growing out of the agrarian disorders has not, according to the latest telegraphic reports reaching here from Cernowitz, on the border, been exaggerated.

It is estimated tonight that 400 farms in Moldavia have been devastated, 3,000 fugitives have fled over the Roumanian frontier into Austria, and a total of 10,000 Jews are homeless.

The number of dead and wounded cannot be given accurately, but reports of today give a total of about 50 men killed and 150 wounded.

The outbreak seems today to have been partially suppressed. The Roumanian government is still sending troops into the affected district. Practically the entire province of Moldavia has been involved.

The movement is more really agrarian than anti-Semitic. The peasants are in revolt against the great farming trust, which has leased half the arable lands in Moldavia. The absentee landlords who control the trust are Jews, and this fact brings the ire of the peasants down upon the Jews they meet, and to this antipathy is added strong racial feeling arising from other causes.

On Thursday 500 peasants tried to "invade" Michaeleni despite the fact that there was a sufficient number of Roumanian troops in this town to stop the rioters. The peasants at first got the upper hand because the soldiers, acting upon the orders of the prefect or the town were not permitted by their officers to open fire. In the face of the menaces of the furious peasants, however, some of the soldiers did fire against orders. This volley killed 15 of the rioters and wounded 45, whereupon the peasants withdrew.

A more successful attack was made at Vaslui, to the south of Jassy. Here a body of 2,000 peasants forced their way into the town. The prefect did not have sufficient troops at his command to stop the infuriated countryside. He stood by, a helpless witness, while the rioters in an incredibly short space of time plundered practically all the buildings on these principal streets of Vaslui and set them on fire. The peasants had looted freely, and then fire completed the destruction.

The prefect sent in a hurried appeal for reinforcements, but the soldiers, ignorant of this step, remained in the town until the soldiers arrived. Then ensued a serious fight, in which the soldiers won. Twenty rioters were killed and many were wounded. The commander of the troops, Maj. Calot, sustained serious injuries.

The entire Roumanian division was up in arms. The authorities were powerless and the peasants pillaged, burned and devastated everywhere. All the buildings in the village of Halesnesti, Halesnesti and Nulesen were demolished, leaving the villages in ruins.

It is estimated that not less than 8,000 fugitives have fled to the Austrian province of Bukovina, where they are being cared for.

The most serious fight of the day occurred near Piatra, a town about 60 miles southeast of Jassy. Several thousand peasants marched against this town, where an entire regiment of infantry was stationed. The soldiers charged the peasants with fixed bayonets. The peasants replied with rifle and revolver fire and then the troops began shooting back. The fighting lasted for over an hour before the rioters retreated. They had 45 men killed, 67 wounded and 100 of the number were captured by the soldiers. The troops had eight men killed and 27 wounded. The estimate of 10,000 Jews without homes is considered fairly conservative. Most of the fugitives saved absolutely nothing, escaping with their lives, luckily.

Four thousand Jews fled to Bucharest, where the authorities are now making every effort to assist them, but practically all are obliged to sleep in the open air.

Fugitives escaping into Austria tell terrible stories of the outrages, but tonight they are so worn out with their flight or so under the spell of fear that they cannot give a detailed account of their experiences. Fugitives from Botosani, the first to reach the frontier, declared tonight that a body of 2,000 peasants succeeded in forcing their way into town after midnight. The people of Botosani had been informed of their coming and most of the women and children had been hidden in the frontier. The men remained behind for the purpose of offering resistance and defending their property. The reports are to the effect that the rioters killed many persons in Botosani, but it has been impossible to get figures.

The peasants had carefully planned for the uprising. They had perfected an organization and determined upon the day to begin. They were subdivided into bands of 1,000 each. Each band had an appointed leader, and the leaders had been informed exactly as to where they could commit outrages without fear of serious resistance.

In the town of Botosani, the search of meat and bread is beginning to be a real suffering. A number of butcher and baker shops were destroyed and the remainder have been closed up. Nobody dares to sell meat. "Wild" situation in this district is slightly better today, the conditions in the district of Dorogol, about 50 miles to the northwest of Botosani, have changed for the worse. The tenants of all the farms near Harsia have fled.

The town of Dorogol was attacked yesterday by a body of 4,000 peasants. The local clergyman made efforts to calm the excited masses. The peasants would not listen and swept the priest out of their path. A regiment of cavalry was sent to the town, but it was attacked the peasants vigorously. The mob finally was driven back, but not before many men had been killed or wounded.

The situation at Jassy is still menacing. Eight thousand soldiers have been concentrated there.

It is reported that university students from Bucharest and Jassy indicated the farmers to insurrection. They are said to have traveled from village to village, provoking the peasants by fiery speeches and the distribution of violently worded pamphlets. The latest report from Cernowitz declares the Austrian farmers residing in the district of Sereth and Suceava, in Bukovina, secretly crossed the Roumanian frontier and joining the revolutionists, assisted them in the predatory expeditions. When returning to Austria laden with booty many of these Austrian raiders were imprisoned. The Austrian authorities have given orders to permit no peasants on the frontier to leave their villages without giving a full explanation of their intended journeyings.

Austrian gendarmes are doing patrol service along the Roumanian frontier.

The Austrian garrison at Cernowitz has been ordered to be ready for active duty. It is feared that the ordinary force of gendarmes will not be sufficient to restrain the excited peasants on the Austrian side of the frontier, who all day long have been fraternizing with the Roumanian refugees.

Interviews were obtained today with some fugitives at Izkani, an Austrian town very close to the Roumanian frontier. These pretend to have seen young girls tied up in sacks and

thrown into the Sereth river. The Roumanian government has notified the Austrian foreign office of its purpose to do its best to protect the lives and property of foreigners in Moldavia. Up to the present time they have asked Roumania for the protection of Austrian citizens only, but the Vienna newspapers are urging Baron von Aehrenthal, minister of foreign affairs, to interfere in behalf of humanity. There is little inclination on the part of Austria, however, to create further embarrassment for the Roumanian cabinet.
