American predominance among the speculators, lawyers and other professionals are also Americans. The general tone in business circles is very low. There are more rascals in the square foot on Montgomery, and California Streets than anywhere else on earth. Irishmen and rogues are almost synonymous terms here. I make this statement liberally. The writer thinks the Californians generous and enterprising with all their faults, and in San Francisco the very paradise for men. There is less money in education in institutions than in the State. Theatres are better patronized in San Francisco than in any other city of its size in the world. At the elections for officers of the New York Mining Exchange, yesterday, two tickets were in the field, both claiming to be regular. The following were elected: President, Geo. B. Satterlee; Vice-President, Henry C. Hardy; Treasurer, Geo. Stanton, Jr.; Chairman, A. J. Peters; Secretary, John T. Scott; Assistant Secretary, A. R. Gallacher.

Jay Gould and Russel Sage, of the Colorado party, on Wall Street, yesterday, spoke in high terms of the recent trip, and the country, climate, and people visited. Sage said the trip was remarkably successful. All the roads as far west as Ogden, which was the western limit of the trip, were found in an excellent condition. The excursionists saved a great deal by taking along with them from different points persons with whom they had business. They were carried until matters in which they were interested were settled. Gould had been very successful in pushing the construction of his new telegraph lines. Many contracts were let and work begun in as many directions. A contract was also been let for all the wire necessary. He was certain a large portion of the lines contemplated would be ready for operation in a few months. Sage said that his election to the directorship of the Pacific Mail was a genuine surprise to him. He could not say what the plans for the future of the company were. A conference of those most largely interested will be held to-morrow.

The Tribune to-day says: There is a rumor that the latest Tammany preference for 1880 is a ticket for Davis and Hendricks. John Kelly is said to have decided Hendricks not strong enough for the first place and to have been able to find no substitute who suits him as well as Judge Davis.

The Sun says: David Davis is spoken of as the democratic candidate for President, but why should he be the democratic candidate? Why should not the democratic party go over, all hands, bag and baggage, to the third party, seeing that it holds democratic principles and dares maintain them.

FOREIGN.

LONDON, 2.—Madrid dispatches state that: In the Cortes to-day Senor Murtos demanded the abolishment of the oath of allegiance. The minister of the interior replied that deputies might refuse to take the oath, but it could not be abolished. Senor Castellar said the oath was a relic of the feudal system. He would take it but only under protest.

Vice Admiral Seymour, of the British navy, in the London Morning Post, says the facts concerning the recent naval engagement off the Peruvian coast are that the Peruvian ironclad turret ship Huascar sank the Chilean wooden ship Esmeralda, and the Peruvian armor plated ship Independencia, in pursuing the Chilean wooden ship Cardovonga, ran on a reef and was wrecked.

LONDON, 3.—Investigations into the expressions alleged to be used by the French Archbishop of Aix with reference to Jules Ferry's education bill, show the charge to be unfounded or at least the language furnishes no sufficient cause for prosecution.

The steamer A. E. Nordenfjold has sailed for Behring's Straits by way of Suez Canal in quest of the

steamer Vega, containing the Swedish Arctic explorer, Prof. Nordenfjold and party.

Official dispatches from Algiers give an account of the disturbances in the province of Constantine. Eight men of the escort of an officer of an Arab department were killed, but the official escaped. Three battalions of infantry and two detachments of artillery have been sent to quell the outbreak.

Baron Lionel Nathan De Rothschild, chief partner in the banking firm of Rothschild & Co., is dead. Henry Dore, grocer, of Hulme, has failed, liabilities £100,000.

Rawthorne & Monk, cotton manufacturers, Preston, have failed, liabilities £27,000.

Hetcher & Rider, merchants, Liverpool, in the South American trade failed, liabilities are believed to be heavy.

TELEGRAPHIC NOTES.

An avalanche has fallen on the village of Fontana, in the Canton of Tessin, Switzerland, and destroyed the church and several houses. Six inhabitants were killed.

Mount Etna is ejecting enormous volumes of ashes, and the destruction of property is immense. The stream of lava, which has interrupted the road at Passa Pescara, is half a mile wide and a hundred feet deep.
