SENATE.

WASHINGTON, 10.—Wallace

introduced a bill to authorize the

exchange of subsidiary coin for

trade dollars. The bill pro-

vides that the Secretary of the

Treasury may, at his discretion,

exchange for trade dollars at the

rate of 100 cents for each of said

dollars and they shall forthwith be

redeemed into subsidiary coin, and

the said coin, if any, may be used

by the Secretary of the Treasury

to pay the expense of sending

subsidiary coin to such persons or

places, as may be designated by

the Secretary of the Treasury.

The bill also provides that the

exchange of trade dollars shall cease

on and after the passage of this

act.
