

GREAT RECEPTION GIVEN MR. BRYAN

After a Strenuous Day He Arrives
In Chicago Amid a Blaze
Of Glory.

BELIEVES HE'LL BE ELECTED.

Accuses Republican Party of Preparing
to Purchase the Election—De-
mands Publicity of Contributions.

Chicago, Oct. 19.—William J. Bryan arrived in this city tonight at 8 o'clock in a blaze of glory after an all-day trip through the state. A dense throng assembled at the Union station to greet him as his special pulled in, an hour and 15 minutes later, from the Cook county Democratic headquarters, where he emerged from the station a great quantity of red fire and Roman candles were set off, the crowd all the while wildly cheering. As the long procession of motor cars passed down the street, their occupants continued the cheering. From Pilsen park the Democratic candidate was escorted to Arcene's hall, where another big crowd was on hand and accorded him an ovation.

IF BRYAN IS ELECTED.

Many in the Pilsen park audience were laboring people. "If I am elected president," said Mr. Bryan, "and the more I travel and mingle with the people the more convinced I am that I will be elected; if I am elected I intend to have a secretary of labor as a member of the cabinet. The affairs of the workingman of this country are too great not to have a representative in the president's advisory board. From that secretary I should seek advice on legislation of interest to the workingman."

Taking up the subject of publication of campaign funds, Mr. Bryan said: "I asked a large audience whether they were in favor of the Republican method of publishing the contributions after election, or the Democratic way in publishing them before. I asked all in favor of the Republican way to hold up their hands. Not one hand was displayed."

The feature of William J. Bryan's journey through his native state of Illinois today was the accusation, repeatedly made, that the Republican party was now preparing to purchase the election. The statement, first made at Alton, caused a large audience. The Democrats, he said, were asking only for \$100,000 with which to finish the work of the campaign, while the Republicans were asking for a million.

"What do they need money for now?" he inquired, and answering his own question he declared that it was "for use on election day, as they have used it after."

The trip to this city from Lincoln was made via St. Louis, and the Democratic candidate for president all along the line of travel through this state was accorded enthusiastic demonstrations by large and cheering crowds.

He delivered 16 speeches in all, some of them of considerable length. Stops were made at East St. Louis, Granite City, Alton, Carlinville, Girard, Springfield, Lincoln, Bloomington, Pontiac, Dwight, Joliet, and Lemont, and several other places not on the schedule.

At Elmhurst he met his former running mate, Adlai E. Stevenson, the present candidate for governor, and both spoke to an immense audience. The confidence of Mr. Bryan in his election was expressed when, in speaking to a demonstrative crowd at Lincoln, he declared that he would be in Washington about March 4.

One of the impressive features of the trip was the demonstration accorded him at Joliet. But 10 days ago he spoke there in the same place, he talked mainly on the labor question. Vociferous applause greeted him when he said: "My friends, I think too much of the next generation to stop my efforts to rid this country of the evil of private monopoly. I am willing to go down on my knees every morning and say to my Father in heaven, 'Give us this day our daily bread,' but God forbid that I should make my countrymen go down on their knees in the morning and say to a trust magnate, 'Give us this day our daily bread,' and have him answer, 'I will if you vote the ticket I want you to.' You cannot afford to fasten that sort of a system on this country or on any other country."

Mr. Bryan will leave Chicago at 6:45 a. m. tomorrow on the Monon railroad in his special car attached to a regular train and will speak in Indiana during the day and in Louisville tonight.

SPEECH AT ALTON.

Alton, Ill., Oct. 19.—Standing on the exact spot where Lincoln and Douglas concluded their debate in 1858, William J. Bryan, Democratic candidate for president, in a 30-minute speech here today to an immense crowd openly charged that the Republican party was endeavoring to purchase the election and dare not tell in advance how much money they are asking to have on election day. Mr. Bryan told his auditors that the tide was running toward the Democratic party and referred to the straw vote taken in different parts of the country to substantiate the statement. He said:

"What does Mr. Taft's position mean in regard to the campaign contributions? It means that if you know before the election what contributions they are getting you might not vote the Republican ticket, and what does that mean? Why, it means that if you vote the Republican ticket and find after the election what they would not allow you to know before you will be sorry that you voted the Republican ticket. I am going to draw the only conclusion that can be drawn here and that is that they are doing today, and knowingly doing today, what they are not willing for you to know they are doing."

"We have opened our books. We have given names of the men who contributed and the amounts and you can therefore judge of the influence at work. We have not only given you the amounts contributed to the national committee, but we have given you the amounts contributed to the congressional committee. They promise to give you, after the elections, the amounts contributed to the national committee, but they have never promised to let you know even after the election what contributions they receive for the congressional committee, and we have well grounded suspicions that they are using their congressional committee to cover the returns that they don't intend to tell you about at all. I demand now, I have before, that they shall tell you now whether they are going to announce after the election the contributions to their congressional campaign fund, and if they are willing to announce after the election the contributions to the national committee and are not willing to announce the contributions to their congressional committee, what explanation will they give? What is keeping you from drawing? My friends, within the last few days, the money has commenced to pour into the

Republican committee. They told you in August that it always carried the country in August, but to wait until September. We waited until September and I carried the country in September. Then they said wait until October and we waited until October and they had not opened their campaign and the tide that has been running ever since the convention named the Democratic ticket, continued to run.

STRAW VOTES.

"What do the straw votes that are being taken say? They say that not in August, not in September, not the first of October alone, but in the middle of October, the tide is running our way and that, whether they take the poll in New York City or in Iowa, the poll taken by Republican papers shows enough gains for the Democratic ticket. Now what? Now come out the contributions from the great corporations that are interested in the campaign. What can they do with this money? There are only two weeks more. The literature is out and paid for. They cannot circulate literature any more to amount to anything for the time has virtually passed. They can't have many more meetings; everywhere they are being told that they are now preparing to purchase this election and dare not tell you in advance how much money they are going to have on hand with which to purchase the election. I want to ask whether you are willing that this shall go on?"

Mr. Bryan continued: "Why is it that they do not go to the laboring man and the farmer and the mechanic for contributions? Why is it that they go to the trust magnate and to the man who gets the benefit of the high tariffs? Why do they go to these men who get the benefit of special legislation?"

"It is because they put these men under obligations to the Republican party and these men expect now to put the Republicans under obligations to them by supplying the sinews of war. What will they do if they win by the aid of these corporations? They will proceed to pay these men back out of the pockets of the people and they have laid the foundation for it in their platform."

ONE MAN KILLED. 22 INJURED IN WRECK

Topeka, Kas., Oct. 19.—A special to the State Journal from Newton, Kas., says, train No. 17, west-bound on the Santa Fe railroad which left Kansas City last night at 9:30 o'clock collided head-on with a stock extra train of Braddock, 15 miles east of here at 3:45 this morning, resulting in the death of Engineer David H. Roberts, of the stock extra, and the injuring of 22 passengers on train No. 17, none seriously. Both trains were running at full speed. It is thought that the accident was caused by the crew on No. 17, running by a block signal.

Conductor French of Kansas City and Engineer Speckin, of Topeka, were in charge of train No. 17. Conductor Plante and Engineer Roberts, both of Emporia, were on the stock extra. About 40 head of cattle were killed and the engines were damaged to a considerable extent.

Among the passengers injured was T. D. Stanips, Oals, N. D., lip cut. The cause of the wreck will not be known until the coroner's jury has determined, but it is said to have been disobedience of signals.

The accident occurred on a short piece of single track long between Braddock and Walton. With the exception of this space the Santa Fe is double tracked between Emporia and Newton, a distance of 73 miles.

JAPAN WELCOMES AMERICAN FLEET

Officers Say it Was Heartiest
And Most Perfectly Carried Out
Of the Many Receptions.

WAS SIMPLY ASTONISHING.

American Uniform is an "Open Sesame" Everywhere—Sincerity of
Hosts is Undoubted.

Tokio, Oct. 20.—The reception accorded the American Atlantic fleet by the government and people of Japan is conceded by the American naval officers to be the heartiest and the most perfectly carried out of the many receptions received by the fleet since it sailed from Hampton Roads. Rear Admiral Sperry said to the Associated Press today that he was utterly unable to say how it had been accomplished; but that the welcome given the fleet and its officers and men here has been so carefully planned and carried out to the minute detail that a lasting impression has been stamped upon the mind of every American who has witnessed it.

The men of the American and Japanese fleets are fraternizing everywhere throughout Tokyo and Yokohama. Every wish of the American sailors is anticipated and each bluejacket finds an English-speaking guide among the Japanese sailors. The American uniform is the "open sesame" everywhere, the cordiality of the Japanese extending even to the inhabitants of the most remote villages.

JAPANESE VERY SINCERE.

It is impossible to doubt the sincerity of the Japanese. The American officers and sailors are already beginning to understand the fact that the evident desire on the part of the Japanese for the friendship of America is not founded upon opportunism; but finds its source in a sincere desire to show that such friendship, at least on the part of Japan, has existed always; and that this visit of the fleet merely affords the expression of that feeling.

There can be no doubt that the simultaneous visits of the American exposition commissioners, the Pacific coast business men and the Atlantic fleet are a part of an organized plan of the Japanese to finally wipe out all misunderstandings between Japan and America and to give the visiting Americans an insight into the real attitude of Japan toward the United States.

It is absolutely certain that already the desired effect upon the Americans has been produced. Since the arrival of the fleet not a single unpleasant incident has occurred, though the sailors of both fleets are swarming through the towns about Yokohama and Tokio.

Speaking at the dinner given by Ambassador O'Brien last night, Admiral Sperry said that he was unable to account for the perfect way in which the reception to himself and his men had been carried out; but that it certainly surpassed anything of the kind that he had ever seen.

Early Tuesday morning Admiral Sperry will be received at the imperial palace, and on the morning of Wednesday the admirals and captains of the fleet will be the guests of the emperor at the palace. Admiral Sperry will convey to the emperor a message from President Roosevelt. The words of this message have not been given out; but there is reason to believe that it breathes a spirit of friendship and sympathy, and expresses keen appreciation of the traditional friendship between the two nations and an earnest wish for the strengthening and continuance of the friendly relations of the past.

It is uncertain what reply the emperor will make when this message is presented by Admiral Sperry; but it is considered possible that he may break his rule and make some statement in terms similar to those used by President Roosevelt.

SAILORS ASHORE.

Three thousand sailors from the American fleet are granted shore liberty daily, and it is remarkable that notwithstanding their long confinement aboard ship not a single difficulty has been reported; bearing out of the statement of Admiral Sperry, made in one of his speeches here, that the American sailor of today is the result of that development and education which Japan is seeking in every department of her national life.

Americans throughout Japan are enthusiastic regarding the visit of the fleet and the cordiality of the reception accorded their fellow countrymen, though the program is so elaborate and so fully carried out that at times it becomes almost monotonous. Still the visiting Americans are given an opportunity to see more of Japan than any ordinary tourist could possibly accomplish in the same time.

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PLANKS FOR "AMERICAN" PLATFORM

The so-called "American" platforms contain a great deal of falsehood, nonsense, and deception. But the following "principles" are part of the program, though not formally inserted in the platform, and should be considered by all voters:

1. The Chairman of the "American" party mass state convention in the Salt Lake theater Monday evening, Sept. 28, declared a war of extermination to be waged against the Mormon Church officials in the fall campaign. "To carry the county and judicial district for the 'American' party and thus start the machinery of the courts in motion to accomplish THE IMPRISONMENT or EXILE of the band of twenty-six, this is the program of the 'Americans' as announced at the state convention."—Salt Lake Herald, Sept. 29.

A vote for the ticket supported by the Tribune is a vote for a program that includes the imprisonment and exile of every prominent Church leader. "Crucify! Crucify!" is the key note of the Tribune campaign.

2. Another declaration of principles involves the raising of the taxes on all farm property in the county. This was intimated in the Tribune during the bond campaign, as follows:

"Queer, it is not, that since the [smelter case] decision the farm lands have decreased in value for the purpose of taxation? In other words, the lands are not so valuable as they were, and farming upon smelter smoke was more productive from the dollar and cent standpoint of the farmer than the filling of the soil. While there has been a large increase in the value of property for taxable purposes in Salt Lake City, there has been a decrease in the property outside, and the farm lands are not worth as much as they were a year ago. I SAY IT IS QUEER, but remember it is a fact."

A vote for the ticket supported by the Tribune means a vote for the increase in taxes, principally for the benefit of the politicians who are in it for "the spoils."

The following is Tribune doctrine:

"Apropos of the new and petty war recently started by the municipal government on the women of the town, the liquor dealers and the gambling fraternity, one of the 'enemy' said to us the other day: 'It may be a hard thing to say, and perhaps harder still to maintain, but I believe that billiard halls, saloons, and houses of ill fame are more powerful reforming agencies here in Utah than churches and schools, or even that the Tribune.'"

"Freedom is the first requisite of manhood, and if it can be won without excesses, so much the better. If it can't, never mind the excesses; win the freedom."—Tribune, March 6, 1881.
