

MRS. FIELDING RID OF A BAD HUSBAND

Secures a Divorce from Convict,
Bigamist, Embezzler, Who
Treated Her Cruelly.

FIVE YEARS OF UNHAPPINESS.

Left Her Home With Babies at Night
While He Went Off and Enter-
tained Others.

William Frank Fielding, convict, bigamist, embezzler, telegraph operator and bookkeeper, was divorced by his wife, Mrs. Olive L. Fielding, this morning, who charged him with almost everything on the criminal calendar. She was granted the custody of their two minor children, \$25 a month alimony and her home, which was taken away from her fraudulently, was restored to her.

Fielding is now serving a sentence in the state prison of Washington on the charge of embezzlement. Mrs. Fielding has not seen or heard of him only indirectly since he eloped with Miss Annie V. Carter and married her on March 16, 1907.

In her testimony before Judge Morse this morning she said that they were married on Nov. 19, 1904. She had some property and Fielding entered into an agreement with the Peterson investment company to build a house on the property. When the house was built, Fielding induced his wife to deed the property to him on numerous pretenses. He held the property against her will after the house was built and refused to give her the deed.

Fielding left her at home night with the babies, she said, while he went out and accompanied other women to places of amusement. He was also abusive and ill treated her.

FINED FOR CONTEMPT.

William Yates was found guilty of contempt of court this morning by Judge Lewis and fined \$10 which he paid. Yates was served with two bench warrants and he paid no attention to them. He was finally arrested and brought before the court to answer to the charge of contempt. The court first ordered that Yates appear before a referee on supplementary proceedings in the case of the Daynes Music company against him for the collection of a debt.

Priscilla R. Collins seeks a divorce from J. M. Collins on the grounds of non-support in a complaint filed today in the Third district court. They were married on Nov. 27, 1907, and there are no children. For the past year, she alleges that she has been compelled to support herself.

BONDS FORFEITED.

When the case of Sadie Clark, charged with abduction and enticing a young girl into an immoral house, was called this morning, the time set for pleading, a default of the bond was entered. This procedure was taken for the purpose of enabling the authorities to secure the return of the woman from Denver where she was arrested yesterday after having jumped her bail bond here. The

woman will be brought back to Salt Lake and made to answer the charge against her.

The case of V. E. Lucas, the soldier charged with assault with a deadly weapon, and in which the complaining witness is Miss Caroline Hasard, a former sweetheart, was postponed today until May 11 under an agreement between the prosecution and the counsel for the defendant.

EARL HENTZ PLEADS.

Earl Hentz, the young man charged with a statutory offense upon complaint of John Carr, father of May Carr, was arraigned before Judge Bowman this morning and entered a plea of not guilty. His hearing was set for May 13. In default of answer, he was remanded to the custody of the sheriff.

but the chief interest centered in the beautiful song cycle reserved for the second part. It was an ambitious undertaking and while some of the voices fell under the requirements of the more difficult passages, yet the rendition as a whole was excellent, and the appreciation of the audience manifested itself unmistakably throughout. Mrs. Peters' flute like notes ran like a thread through the oriental cadences and told especially well in the concerted numbers, though an evident timidity in taking the high notes in her solo detracted somewhat from their effect. Her solo "The Cradle Song," however, was beautifully done. The same was noticeable in Mr. Brines, though he did some fine work in the concerted pieces. Miss Edna Conn made a distinct hit, her beautiful contralto telling finely throughout. Fred Smith gave, perhaps, the most artistic work of the quartet, the bass solo "To Buddha," given with the others, being especially good. To Mrs. M. J. Brines as accompanist falls equally distinctive credit, her expression of the seasons, Persian theme, being excellent. Among the more beautiful numbers were the "Heima" song for soprano and alto duet and quartet, "Nightfall in Hyderabad," "Cradle Song" and "Indian Dancers," though all were a delight to the listeners. The three should be repeated before a larger audience.
