SIMPLE BIOGRAPHICAL.

Hon. Frank Martin, is a native of the gtate of Arkansas and was born in the year 1866. He graduated from a course in law at Ann Arbor, and be-gan the practise of his profession in 1892, in Bolse, Idaho, whither he came and established his residence the same year from Oregon, to which state he journeyed from the home of his nativ-ity in 1877.

Mr. Martin cast in Idaho, for the Democratic party, his first vote, and over since that time has been promin-ently identified with the movements of the party of his choice. In 1896, he was chairman of the state Democratic convention which elected delegates to the Chicago convention for the nomi-nation of Bryan. He was elected, in 1900, attorney general for the state of Idaho, which position he filled with henor and distinction.
