SOME HISTORY.

"The Democrats in their state convention, soon after Mr. Dubois' return, had formed a fusion with the Populist party in Idaho, and had pledged to that party that they should have the senatorship which would be made vacant by the retirement of Mr. Dubois. Mr. Dubois then organized his Silver Republican party, and what he called an Electoral Democratic party, and started out on a guerrilla warfare upon the Democratic ticket and sought by every trick and dishonest method to have the Democrats break their pledge to the Populists, and elect him senator. I with many others believed that political parties should be honest as well as individuals, and that we could not honestly betray the Populist party, and that we should stand by our agreement with them. This put me in opposition to Mr. Dubois at the very threshold of his connection with the Democratic party, and I have so remained. DIVORCE MILL MERRILY GRINDS

All Sorts and Conditions of Marital Mis-Matches Reviewed By Judge Morse.

STORMY CHAPTERS ARE READ

State of Matrimony in All Its Divers Moods and Tenses Investigated At Weekly Session.

Married in May and divorced in July is the first experience of Sibyl Watterson in affairs matrimonial. The marriage was in this city and the divorce came about yesterday before Judge Morse in his weekly session. As the testimony showed in court yesterday, the married life of the pair was stormy from the start. A few days after the wedding, Watterson, according to the wife's story, wanted to give his money to his children by a former marriage. This she objected to and more storms followed. In her complaint she alleged that Watterson struck her and had used vile and abusive language towards her. This complaint of Mrs. Watterson was filed after a complaint had been filed by her husband, in which he alleged that the wife was the aggressor, and that she had hit him in the face and had called him vile and abusive names.

Watterson was not in court yesterday, though it was testified to that he had read his wife's complaint and that he had admitted the truth of her allegations. Upon this showing the divorce was granted.

MYRTLE NEVER CAME BACK.

Miller S. Webb was deserted by his wife, Myrtle Huff Webb, and upon proving it to Judge Morse's satisfaction, was granted a decree of divorce. The Webbs were married in 1905 and in 1907 his wife left, presumably upon a visit to the coast. She has failed to return and the desertion was thought to have been shown.

CHANDLER WAS NEGLIGENT.

Failure to support was alleged by Cora Edna Chandler, wife of Harry Butler Chandler until yesterday. They were married in 1906 and he supported her for a year. Since that time, however, he has failed to contribute to her needs and the decree was granted upon this showing.

LIKEWISE ARROWSMITH.

The same cause of action was set out by Jennie Arrowsmith. She alleged in her complaint that she and David Arrowsmith were married in 1898, and that a child aged 6 years was the result of the union. For more than a year, she claimed, he has not provided for her. The decree was granted.

TWO DESERTIONS.

The Buchannans, Charles and Georgia, were married in 1900. The husband declares in the complaint on file with the court that his wife deserted him in St. Louis four years ago. Upon this showing the court separated the pair.

Desertion was charged against James M. Dean by Ella Dean. Her complaint alleged that they were married in 1904 and that a child of two years is the result of the union. In 1907, she says, he deserted her and since that time has not provided for her or her child. The decree awarding the custody of the child to the mother and a bill of divorce were entered.

GALLACHER CASE.

The sensational Gallacher case was disposed of yesterday. Judge Morse granted the decree to the wife, Harriet S., upon the ground of desertion. The complaint filed originally by James L. Gallacher alleged most sensational conduct on the part of the wife. The wife's allegations following were equally sensational. Property division was later effected, and the decree entered yesterday awards divorce to the wife and \$150 per month for the support of herself and eight children.

Upon the report of Referee Howard King, divorce was granted William Eyer as against Bertha Eyer by Judge Armstrong, the complaint alleging infidelity and desertion. They were married March 17, 1908.

"He then formed an alliance with those who were opposed to the governor's policies in suppressing the riots and from that time forward was the champion and apologist of those who had violated the law in Shoshone county in these riots, and he and those he could gather around him, began a campaign of violent abuse and savage attacks upon Gov. Steunenberg and his administration. He is now attempting to reopen those old questions and stir up the old prejudices of those days with the hope that he can thereby gain a few delegates to the Wallace convention and retain the dictatorship of the Democratic party. Should he fail in this, it is an open secret that he intends to leave the party and form an American party in the state.

PROMPTLY SWITCHED.

"He has slandered our people and our state at home and abroad; and in this way has done the state an incalculable injury. He is undemocratic and un-American in the principles he advocates, a Republican upon all the great questions of the day, a political party, a political trickster by instinct, and opposed to permitting an expression of the people upon any question, but in favor of absolute dictation by party machines and political bosses.

"These are some of the reasons why I have always been, and still am, opposed to Mr. Dubois and his control of the Democratic party."

SIMPLE BIOGRAPHICAL.

Hon. Frank Martin, is a native of the state of Arkansas and was born in the year 1866. He graduated from a course in law at Andover, Mass., and began the practice of his profession in 1892, in Boise, Idaho, whither he came after having resided the same year from Oregon, to which state he journeyed from the home of his nativity in 1877.

Mr. Martin came to Idaho, for the Democratic party, his first vote, and ever since that time has been prominently identified with the movements of the party of his choice. In 1896, he was chairman of the state Democratic convention which elected delegates to the Chicago convention for the nomination of Bryan. He was elected, in 1900, attorney general for the state of Idaho, which position he filled with honor and distinction. During the two years previous to his election he acted as secretary of the Democratic state central committee.

In the 16 years that Mr. Martin has been a resident of Idaho—all of the time active in politics—he has never been a supporter of Dubois or in sympathy with the motives and movements of this political gambler.

Utah's Woman Delegate to the National Democratic Convention at Denver Next Week.
