**THEATRE.**—Last evening "Roseland" was presented in fine style. Miss Warr as "Rosa Leigh" was also very good, and deserves great praise for the manner in which she rendered it.

Mr. Lindsay had sufficiently recovered his voice to appear as "Miles McKenna," although it was evident he was still suffering from severe hoarseness.

Mr. De Bar also was given her "Tabitha" with added greatly to the success of the piece.

**SHOOTING AFFRAY.**—Last night, after the performance at the Circus, as some of the members of the company were returning to their hotel they were met near the northwest corner of Emigration Square by a man armed with two revolvers, who, after closely examining several of the men, drew and fired twice, the first taking effect in the back of Mr. Martin Lowanda, inflicting a slight wound; the second ball striking Mr. Henri Stewart, one of the acrobats, in the thigh, making a painful though not dangerous wound. During the excitement the man escaped, and as yet no trace of him has been discovered. Mr. Stewart will probably be confined to his bed several days, but Martin, it is hoped, will be able to appear to-day as usual.

The men were both conveyed to the Salt Lake House, and medical attendance being summoned the balls were successfully extracted by Dr. Fowler.

This morning a report was in circulation that the men were shot by one of our citizens, and that both shots were intended for Martin, he having in some way insulted or injured a lady. Mr. Alexandre Lowanda, the father of the young man, informs us that he has no suspicions whatever, of any one of the citizens, as his son had had no difficulty with any one of them, and had not made the acquaintance of any females here, much less done anything that would have jeopardized his life.

The police have hopes that they will be able to ferret out the perpetrator of the deed.

**TEMPERANCE LECTURE.**—Col. E. Z. C. Judson, widely known as a writer and lecturer by the name of "Ned Tantling," is still in the city, and has made arrangements for the use of the 19th Ward Assembly Rooms in which to deliver a lecture Sunday evening, the 4th of July.

This is the only evening the Rooms can be obtained without interference with other arrangements. The Colonel thinks it is a good night for a good cause, to which proposition, we believe the Bishop sees no objection. Eight o'clock p.m. is the hour.

**THE NEW ORGAN.**—On entering the New Tabernacle to-day, we were filled with admiration at the beauty and grandeur of the great organ, now that the scaffolding has been removed, and the organ case grained and varnished. Its cathedral like shape with immense towers and symmetrical proportions, now stand out beautifully, and the entire work reflects great credit upon Bro. J. Rice, the designer and builder.

When completed the Organ will compare favorably with any in the world for its beauty of design and purity of tone. Bro. Rice informs us that a large amount of work has yet to be bestowed upon it and that the octave of immense pipes in front, which are now white, will be covered with gold leaf, and that many other smaller ornamental pipes have to be placed where the green drapery is now arranged, together with some beautifully carved panel work for the pedestal portion of the case. We have heard but one expression about the Organ from the many visitors who have examined the workmanship and listened to its tones; they think it is a remarkable piece of mechanism to be built in this country, and that it is not inferior, so far as completed, to the eastern and foreign made instruments of its class.
