CONGRESSIONAL.

SENATE.

WASHINGTON, 3.—Bills were introduced and referred as follows—

By Hamlin, fixing the rate of postage on third class mail matter, and for other purposes; referred.

By Robertson, to restore the franking privilege; referred.

Morton submitted a resolution appropriating \$15,000 out of the contingent fund of the Senate, to defray the expenses of the investigation into the facts attending the election of the Hon. Geo. E. Spencer, as United States Senator from Alabama, now being made by the committee on privileges and elections; agreed to.

Edmunds called up the resolution from the House of Representatives in regard to the impeachment of W. W. Belknap, late Secretary of War, which was read, together with the statement of the committee. Edmunds then submitted the following—

"Ordered that the message of the House of Representatives, relating to impeachment, be referred to a select committee to consist of five Senators."

Edmunds said he submitted this order in accordance with the usual custom, though he did not see why the matter should not go to one of the regular committees of the Senate, but as it was the custom to have a select committee, he asked that the order be adopted. The order was then adopted, and the chair was authorized to appoint the committee.

The President *pro-tem*, here announced as the select committee to consider the resolutions of the House in regard to the impeachment of W. W. Belknap, late Secretary of War—Messrs. Edmunds, Conkling, Frelinghuysen, Thurman and Stevenson.

Morton presented a petition from the colored men of Texas, representing that the present State government of Texas denied them ample school facilities, and asking for such legislation as will compel the State to maintain a system of free schools; referred.

Banning, from the committee on military affairs, reported a bill in regard to leave of absence of army officers; it authorizes leave of absence of officers on duty for sixty days once in two years; for three months once in three years; and for four months once in four years, without deduction of pay or allowances; passed.

WASHINGTON, 3.—The cabinet met at noon to-day, all the members present. It remained in session until after three o'clock. The subjects that received consideration were the institution of criminal proceedings against ex-Secretary Belknap and those associated with him in the practices of bribery and corruption, that have just been officially discovered, and the selection of a new Secretary of War. The President stated to the cabinet that while he could take no steps which might look like persecution towards any one, he had determined not to shrink from the responsibility that rested upon him; he therefore asked the Attorney-General to take immediate steps to proceed with criminal charges against General Belknap and Messrs. Marsh and Tomlinson, and all others that may be shown by any evidence that shall be adduced to have had part in the fearful transactions who were now the subject of attention. Upon this determination of the President there were full and thorough expressions of opinion favoring such action as the President had determined on without delay. The peculiar character of General Belknap's offense, differing in many respects, as it does, from an ordinary case of bribery, was the subject of comment and discussion, the result of which was the reference of the entire matter to the Attorney General, who will take the necessary steps to enter criminal proceedings just as soon as facts can be put in shape to be sworn to. As part of the discussion it was mentioned that there should be no delay in the proceedings because of the progress of an impeachment trial; the two trials will be entirely independent of each other. Judge Pierrpont remained at the Executive Mansion for a short time after the other cabinet officers had gone to their respective departments, for the purpose of getting what facts the President might be possessed of, in accordance with his determination to commence, immediately, proceedings under his charge. The discussion relative to the appointment of a successor to Secretary Belknap was of considerable length, but no decision was arrived at.

The bill introduced by Hamlin, fixing the rates of postage on third class mail matter and for other purposes, proposes, for all third class matter, the following rates of postage, graduated according to distance, viz.—Not exceeding 300 miles 1 cent each 2 ounces or fractional part thereof; between 300 and 800 miles 2 cents; between 800 and 1,500 miles 3 cents, and for each additional 1,000 miles 1 cent additional for each 2 ounces or fractional part thereof. A special rate is, however, proposed for transient newspapers and magazines, namely one cent for every 2 ounces or fractional part thereof, for any distance not exceeding 1,000 miles, but for any greater distance double this rate is to be paid.

Senator Robertson's bill to restore the franking privilege provides simply for the repeal of the act of January 31st, 1873, which abolished it, and for its immediate renewal in the form in which it existed at the time of the passage of said act.

The President has signed the act amendatory of the act admitting Colorado to the Union on an equal footing with the other States.

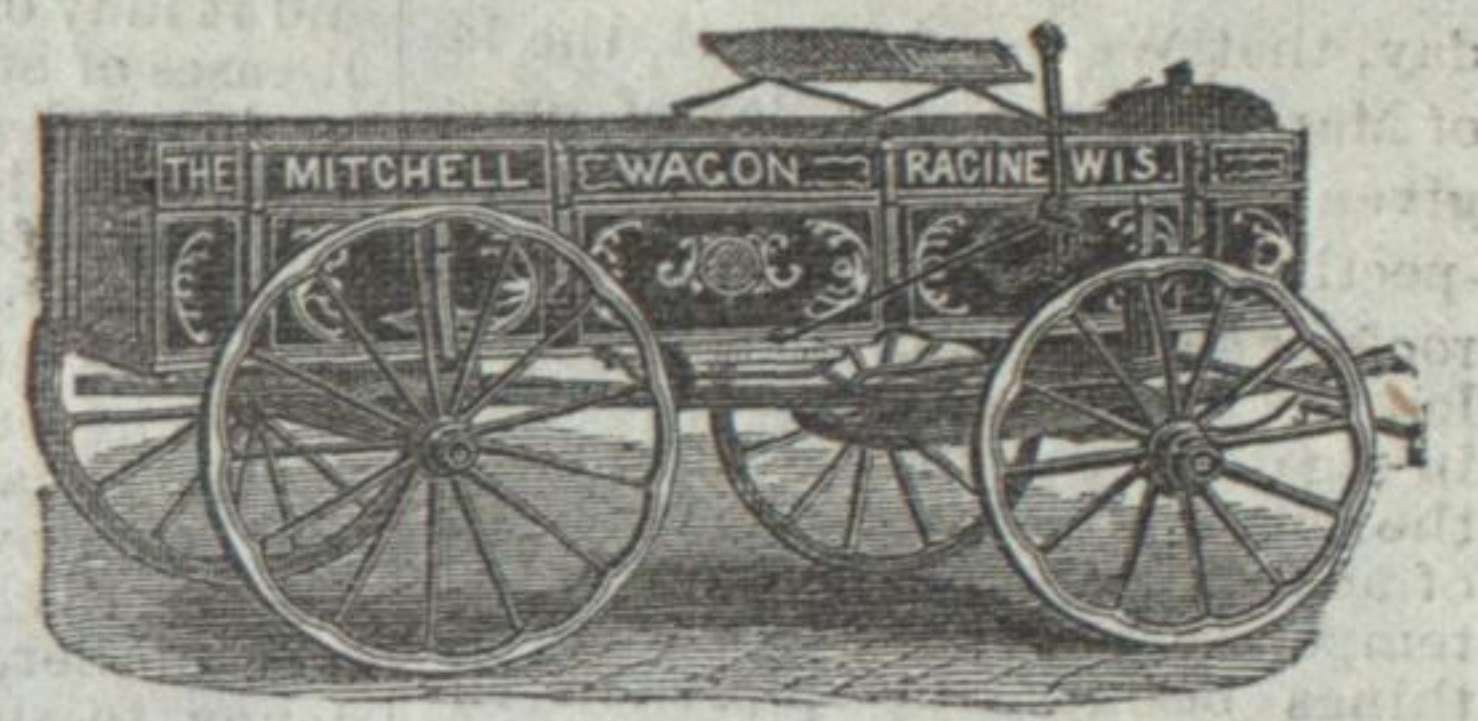
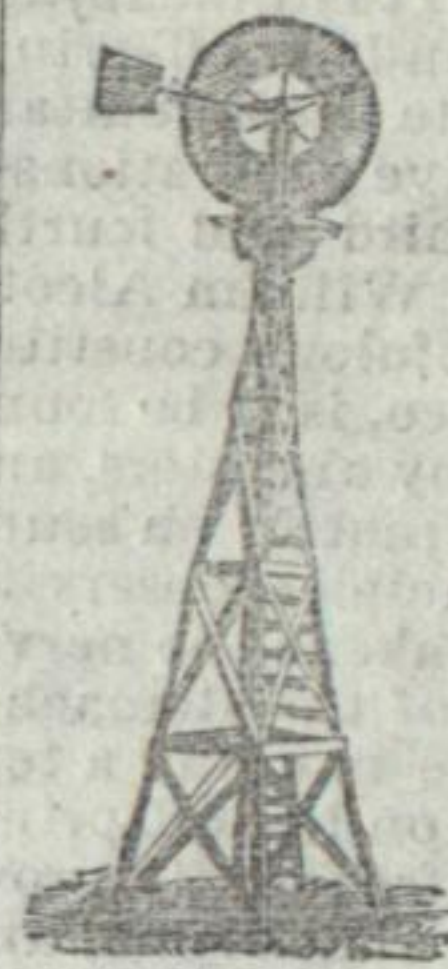
