### BEARS RAISED A HULLABALOO.

Decline in Wall Street Heavier Than for a Long Time.

DEALERS HAD A HOT TIME.

Reaviest Siump in the Trast Stocks-Slight Hally-Live Stock Steady -Wheat Lower

New York, Dec. 11,-An exciting time was counted upon on the stock exchange this morning, and the expectations of outsiders who gathered in the galleries to witness the terment were not disappointed. Saturday's fall in prices had brought in a large volume of selling orders from holders of long stock who have been clinging to their holdings in the expectation that the market would weather the money difficulties until the end of the year, and prices would resist any serious decline. The propensity which prompts humanity to "follow the leader" was strikingly exemplified in the morning stock market, when people who would not think of | lend elling stocks last week when they were 5 to 15 points higher, tumbled over each other to sell this morning. Many of them were forced to do so by the calling loans with which they were holding telr stocks. Last week's shrinkage value of stocks placed as collateral r loans served to cut down the credit facilities of operators. The news of a serious reverse to British orms in South Africa awakened lively apprehension in the minds of Wall street and was an ald to the bears in the hullabaloo they raised to encourage the decline. The so-called trust stocks were the center of attack, and Tennessee coal, Brooklyn transit, American tobacco, sugar, tinplate and Colorado fuel, were all severe-ly handled. After the first violent dip, the bears were actined to take the very inviting profits offered, and commenced to buy, causing some violent recoveries. But the lack of any large demand encouraged them to renewed prices of many stocks below the pre vious low point. New York, Dec. 11 .- The Times' London financial correspondent says: Nervousness and anxiety increase in our money market because it begins to see it is difficult for other markets to supply its necessities in the matter of gold. 
