Blaine Speaks on Trusts, and Butler on the Tariff Issue-

he Town of Hot Springs, Ark. Devastated by a Water Spout.

Cowboys Drowned by a Flood Caused by a Cloud Burst.

The Former Speaks on Trusts and the Later on the Pariff.

Dover, Me., Aug. 31 .- Hon. Jas. G. Blaine spoke at Foxcroft this afternoon. In opening he proceeded at once to the consideration of trusts, charging they flourished to a greater extent under the free trade policy of England than under the protective policy of the United States. He said the President should have known when he arraigned trusts in his message to Congress that Congress could not dissolve them when their charters were from the State Legislatures or their organizations under state laws. It organizations under state laws. It had been confessed by the democratic House ways and means committee, by Chairman Mills, and every man that stood as an advocate of free trade, that trusts had no possible legal condection with the tariff. The President's charge that trusts had their origin in a protective tariff has not a foot of ground to stand upon and was foot of ground to stand upon and was contradicted in every line of free trade experience. The speaker said trusts had no place in a national campaign.
They are state issues, and the republicans of Maine, at least, can be depended upon to look after those in

their own state. BUTLER ON THE TARIFF.

Boston, August 31 .- General Benjamin F. Butler this evening addressed a large audience in Tremont Temple on the tariff and fisheries questions. Theoretically, he said, free trade be-tween all nations as between all men is correct in principle. That is if all nations in all things were exactly the same and on equal footing. But such conditions of equality cannot exist among nations, and therefore all theories upon the question of free trade become useless.

"I cite the President on my side as against free trade, but I must confess at the same time that the President seems to try to get as near being a free trader as he can. I believe if he had known as I know, how much a protec-tive tariff has done for the American workingmen his tariff message would never have been penned. It is not his fault but the laboring man's misfor-tune that he did not know the facts." The speaker declared his opinion that during the late war we owed to the effects of the protective tariff the means which upheld the unity of our people, the consolidation of our government, the glory of our achievements and the military power of our country, and added: "Is it not a matter of remark that the attempted destruction of our protective system comes from those who did not defend the life of the country in that war, and a majority of whom mourn the cause which the protective tariff caused to be lost to them?" General Butler attacked the Mills bill, and then turned his attention to

the fisheries question, and touching upon the various treaties that had been enforced between the United States and Great Britain he said: agree with the President that the bill giving him the power of retaliation was a poor bill, unworthy of the dignity of the United States Government, and if he had vetoed it on that ground I should have been quite in-clined to support him. My criti-cism of the oill is that it contains an enactment in regard to keep-ing vessels and goods of the Canadians in the British dominion of North America out of our ports, when we learn that in these North American British possessions our vessels are kept out of their ports. Pray why don't the United States take the bull by the horns and give the President the right and the power whenever he finds that a single vessel, however small, is kept out of any British port, or anywhere unlawfully, to keep out of the ports of the United States every British ves-sel, however great. Until that wrong shall be redressed we should retaliate the wrongs done to American fisher-men in Canadian waters by an action against the Cunard steamsnips sailing under the ensigns of the British govrnment and things will be brought to an end. The first question that springs to the lips is, 'Is the President in earnest?" If he is, let him enforce retaliation for outrages by the power he has had since March, 1887. If he will do that, he will show that his paper is


