OPPOSITION TO SMELTER SITE

Farmers Who Would be Affected By Crop Destroying Fumes Suggest Better Location

OBSEQUIES OF MRS. LEAVITT.

Impressive Services in Honor of Esteemed Pioneer—Hearing of Damage Suit—News Briefs.

Ogden, Feb. 8.—The smelter meeting held last evening at Plain City was not so largely attended as had been expected, only about 40 being present; who were about evenly divided on the proposition. Five speakers were against the building of the smelter on the proposed site just west of the Utah Hot Springs, while four speakers are in favor of its being built wherever the backers of the project desire to build it.

At Plain City two petitions are being circulated. One of them is signed by 13 farmers representing approximately 9,000 acres of land, are against the movement. The other petition has not been turned in yet. At Willard only four who were asked to sign the petition against the smelter project refused to do so, hence at least 90 per cent of the farmers and fruitgrowers in that

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section it can be safely said are opposed to the smelter site. At Pleasant View only one out of 30 refused to sign the petition and at North Ogden about the same condition exists.

From this it would appear that a large majority of the agriculturists are opposed to the erecting of a large smelter on the present site of the Utah Smelting company's small plant. Those favoring the opposition do not desire, however, to be misunderstood on the proposition. They are heartily in favor of Weber county getting an independent smelter, but want the mine owners to locate on a site about a mile west of the location of the present smelter. They say that that point offers an ideal site with a barren waste of country surrounding it for several miles, so that the fumes could do no damage, and therefore both for the smelter owners and the farmers it would be a better location, as the smelter would not damage crops and there would be no damage to pay. The farmers would be able to raise crops of all kinds as they do now and the products would bring a better price.

Secy. Reynolds went to Salt Lake City yesterday in the interest of the project, and will spend several days on the same. A meeting with the railroad managers at Salt Lake was not held as expected last evening, hence nothing has been done looking to securing for Ogden a common rate on all kinds of ores, but this matter will be taken up at once.

SUDDEN DEATH OF S. W. RITER

B. Y. School Consolidation Question Before Church Board.

Logan, Feb. 7.—S. W. Riter, brother of W. W. Riter, the Salt Lake banker, and a well known resident of Logan, died very suddenly here this afternoon. He came up town to visit his brother, B. F. Riter, at the Riter Bros. drug store. As he walked into the store he fell to the floor and expired almost immediately. The cause of his death is being investigated. He had just recovered from an attack of the grip. He was 73 years of age and leaves a wife and five children.

B. Y. SCHOOL CONSOLIDATION.

Last night President Joseph F. Smith, who is president of the board of trustees of the Brigham Young college, came to Logan and today a board meeting was held where a full quorum was present. Previous to the meeting of the trustees President Smith was welcomed at the building by the students of the college and the college board. The meeting was held at 10 o'clock with the students before the meeting of the board which immediately followed.

At the board meeting Pres. Linford brought up the consolidation question, and asked the board to hear the arguments of the committees who favor the school being continued in its present condition in respect to higher education. Addressing the board, J. E. Cardon on behalf of the students, J. E. Ballard on behalf of the citizens, Secy. H. Bullen, Jr., and Trustees Martineau and Richard W. Young of Salt Lake. The last speaker introduced the following resolution, which was unanimously adopted:


