an interview in an eastern financial journal. He says: "The copper metal situation is de-cidedly better. I have been in the metal business for 40 years and my ex-perience tells that we are now pass-ing through the worst times that cop-per the metal will see for a long time to come. Copper is not as badly off as other lines of industry, because it has gone through a most drastic period of depression and is now on the mend. A year ago there was an absolute shortage of copper and today conditions are approaching the same point. The surplus that accumulated on this side has been absorbed by European buy-ing and while those purchases have not perhaps all gone into consumption as yet, as would be indicated by the large visible surply reported in London cables, it is moving that way slowly and before any increased supplies can be accumulated here it is my belief that the demand will be sufficient to absorb such production. There is bound to be a return to a natural level of consump-tion of copper in America within the next few mouths. The consumers are a return to a natural level of consump-tion of copper in America within the next few months. The consumers are bare of supplies, and by consumers I mean the users of the manufactured article as well as the manufactures themselves. The present dullness in the trade may continue and the price of copper may work nominally and sen-timentally below the current quota-tions, but eventually—in a month, six weeks or six months—the improvement in general business will change all this and there will be a demand for copper that will keep pace with production."
