

## LOCAL AND OTHER MATTERS.

**HIGH COUNCIL.**—The members of the High Council are requested to meet at the Severance Hall, on Friday, August 19th, at ten o'clock in the forenoon.

**THE WOODHULL HOMICIDE.**—Yesterday an investigation was held in regard to the killing of Mr. H. I. Woodhull, at Little Cottonwood, by C. M. Hawley, Judge of 3d Judicial District.

Nathan Springer, the man charged with the commission of the deed, was refused bail and ordered to be confined until the meeting of the regular term of the District Court. F. H. Bruner, charged with being an accessory to the killing, was admitted to bail in the sum of \$2,000, to await the action of the Grand Jury, which meets next month.

**LAST DAY.**—To-day the giant, giantess, dwarf and Circassian girl are on exhibition for the last time at the Social Hall. Some idea may be formed of the colossal proportions of Mons. Joseph when we say that a gentleman of this city, who stands over six feet in his stockings, walked under his arm the other evening; and the size of Miss Anna Swan may be judged when it is stated that she is still more huge than Mons. Joseph. The dwarf is not the least interesting feature of the exhibition.

**THE WAR NEWS.**—The war news is conflicting to-day, as usual. The Prussians claim a victory before Metz, with 4,000 French slain; while the French report a victory in which 40,000 Prussians were slain. The 40,000 must mean 4,000, the additional thought being probably supplied somewhere during transmission from the seat of war. Four thousand or forty thousand and it makes little difference; and if the French have not yet killed forty thousand Prussians, they are very likely to do so before the war is over.

**"ARRIVALS."**—The *Millennial Star*, of the 26th ult., says:

"Brothers George and Samuel Stringfellow and William Cooper and his brother, Mr. Samuel Cooper, left Salt Lake City, June 27, and New York, per steamship *City of Brooklyn*, July 9, and arrived at Liverpool, July 19, in good health and spirits, after a very pleasant passage. They are on a short visit to their friends in this country."

**TO DESTROY FLIES.**—Mr. John H. Stott of Moroni, San Pete Co., sends the following recipe for a mixture to destroy flies, and as it would be much safer to use than the fluid made with the "poison fly paper," we publish it:

"One pint of milk, a quarter of a pound of raw sugar, two ounces of pepper ground fine, simmer eight or ten minutes and place in shallow dishes where the flies are troublesome."

Mr. Stott says:

"We also have a machine here to destroy grasshoppers, which will destroy them by the bushel. I am not much of a draughtsman, but I can describe the best description I can: Two rollers like the wringers of a washing machine, and a third roller connected with an endless chain, made of linen or some kind of strong stuff. This is to destroy them in our water sects."

The description of the machine is not very clear, and the manner of using is not stated at all, but Mr. Stott says that he will furnish further information upon application.

**"GAS WELLS."**—Oil wells, great natural wonders as they are, are now being eclipsed by gas wells. The owners of a wonderful "gas well," in Bloomfield, New York, are, it is said, experimenting with this natural gas to supply the city of Rochester. The village of Fredonia has been thus lighted for several years past, and at Erie, Pennsylvania, twelve gas wells are now pouring out their inexhaustible stream of gaseous fuel—one of them driving a large flouring mill, supplying the heat to the boilers, formerly obtained at the expense of ten tons of coal daily, and furnishing besides all the light needed, while another well yields enough to propel the pumping engines of the city water-works.

There is no mistake that the world is getting ready for that terrible day, which "shall burn as an oven." The material for that grand and fearful display is being developed and prepared for the occasion!

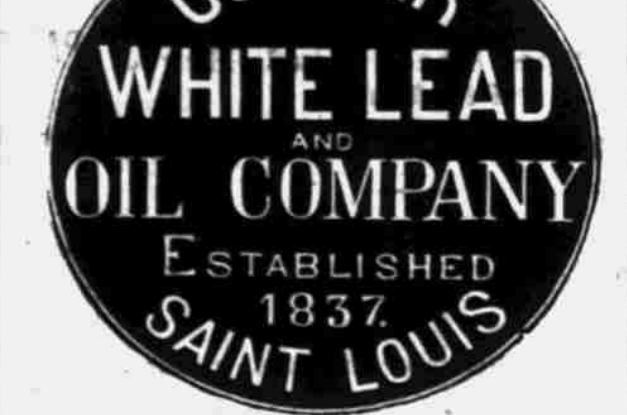
