ZION'S BANK PAYS \$12,000.

GENERAL TONE OF

BUSINESS GOOD

Continued Opposition to Railroads Causes Earnings to Decrease and Stocks to Go Down.

The local business situation in some directions is improving with the acceptable change of weather, and in other directions there is very little doing. In banking, the feature of today, is the disbursement of \$12,000 in dividends declared at a recent meeting by the Zion's Savings Bank & Trust company of this city, one of the most prominent and substantial financial institutions in the west. A prominent local bank official, in commenting on local conditions said. 'Financial conditions remain quiet. There is a disposition on the part of capital to hesitate and wait. The business of the country continues prosperous, and taking this as a guide, it is fair consider the country generally as fairly safe. The worst feature of the situation is that while gross earnings show a considerable gain, this gain is all swallowed up, and something more ebsides in the increased cost of operating due to the raising of wages and the increased cost of material. So all kinds of railway investments which constitute the largest class of securities in the country, by far, are under the present showing not attractive to investors. It seems as though there must come a time when public sentiment must ders. modify its opposition to the railroads, or some of them will be driven to the wall. For the quarter ending March 31 last, the increase in gross earnings of a group of railroads was noted to be 13 millions, while there was a loss in the net earnings of two millions. This is operating to depress the values of all securicies."

But speaking of cost of building ma-terial, the brick men claim an excep-tion should be made in their case as brick is now, they say, as low as it can possibly get: and with prices rang-ing from \$8 to \$18 per thousand, there ought to be no complaint. Of course, the higher the finish the higher the price, and brick made from shale that thas to be hauled from the canyon and taken particular pains with, costs as high as \$30. Makers say there is less money made from brick than there was one year ago. What enhanced prices there may be are swallowed up in the cost of manufacturing. LUMBER PRICES FALL.

### LUMBER PRICES FALL.

Lumber men are still very uneasy over the expected shortage of cars the coming fall, as traffic has increased the coming fail, as traffic has increased much faster than the increase in the number of cars, and the trouble is emphasized by the lack of affiliation between the Hill and Harriman roads which results in not a fear here not emphasized by the left of an roads between the Hill and Harriman roads which results in not a few instances of reloading of lumber en route. Dur-ing the month prices have fallen from \$1 to \$2.60 on all grades of goods arriving from the northwest, and some dealers are looking for a further re-duction. Consequently, they are wait-ing for ordering further for the pres-ent. For some little time the north-west lumbermen have been shut off from their regular California markets. It is said the California dealers are so abundantly supplied and Oregon lumber that although the steamship companies have lowered their rato from \$10 to \$4.50, this reduction does not operate in the nature of an innot operate in the nature of an in-ducement, and there is a flood of stocks headed this way in consequence.

# HARDWARE TRADE STRONG.

HARDWARE TRADE STRONG. The hardware trade continues very strong, although some retailers say they are not selling seasonable goods owing to the pecularities of the weath-er that has been so out of season this spring and summer. However, there is still the heavy call for mining ma-chinery and mining and camp equip-ment. The fishing season is now close at hand, which makes the demand for fishing equipment steady and strong, and there is a very good call for protsman goods. The harness makers report they are simply swamped with orders, and in sadlery they are two weeks behind. ## DOMESTICS FIRMER.

In the wholesale dry goods trade, the rotton goods market is active with fair sales, withe prices on heavy good print rloths, many lines of convertibles, grashes, duck, and lines of domestics firmer, and a tendency to rise higher. Fine contons are less irregular. Many of the season's fabrics intended for dis-ribution in April and May, are reported still on hand, and jobbers are preferring to carry them over to the next year's

The shoe trade has been very fair, with sales of mostly low cut goods holding their own. Dealers are advis-ing wearers of brown vici Oxfords to use banana peels in cleaning and polishing their shoes, as this is better than the regular collish as there is than the regular polish, as there is something in the fruit peel that rein-vigorates the leather.

ers' association, which alleges that the

ers' association, which alleges that the express companies, through their power and facilities as common carriers, are usurping the prerogatives of the banking associations and at the same time em-ploying the capital of the banks in the conduct of their business. It is alleged that the exchange business of the express companies and the relations which they have with the railroad companies enables them to seriously discriminate sgainst regular commercial operations of banking institutions.

The complaint is directed against the Adams, United States, American, Pacific, Wells-Fargo, Southern and Great North-ern Express companies.
