Some examples of the destructive work of the elm scale and the cottony maple scale may be seen in the office of County Horticultural Inspector Sorenson at the City and County building. The insects were secured from several trees in South Temple, 12th and 13th Streets, and near West Temple. The inspector recommends that the trees having such pests should be immediately sprayed with kerosene emulsion.

The sub-committee investigating the location of the new agricultural station provided by the last Legislature will meet next Tuesday evening at the hotel of Prof. W. F. White, who will report on an analysis of soils of rural sites under consideration. The sub-committee includes Profs. McAllister and Whitmore of the Agricultural college, Messrs. OFFICIALS RAISE BANNER OF PEACE

Probabilities of Settlement Between Chairman Wall and Engineer Riter.

REACHING OF THE COMPROMISE

Special Privileges to Citizens With "Pulls" and "Influence" the Cause Of Much of the Trouble.

It is now believed that the trouble between Chairman Wall of the board of public works, and City Engineer Riter over the South Temple street paving and sidewalk grades is finally settled and that no further controversies will arise between those officials as to these matters. The improvements on the street were inspected yesterday afternoon and the troubles investigated by Councilmen Tuddenham, Martin, Hobday, E. H. Davis, A. J. Davis and A. F. Barnes, accompanied by Assistant City Attorney, Bramel, Chairman Wall and City Engineer Riter.

The investigation occupied several hours and all the matters in controversy were thoroughly considered and a compromise was reached and the work will proceed. It appears that the trouble over the sidewalk grades is due to the fact that W. P. Noble, John E. Dooly, James Glennington and other prominent residents were able to get the city council some years ago to allow them to pave some streets with sidewalks and houses when the sidewalks on the intersecting streets were being put in on a permanently established grade and South Temple street was being graded for paving it left a very deep cut adjoining those premises which necessitated bringing the old walks down to the permanent grade.

Mr. Noble protested against the cutting of the sidewalk, but professed also against lowering his walk on South Temple street, and filed suits in the district court to enjoin the city from making the changes. Since then the city officials having charge of the work on the street mentioned have been trying to settle the matter. Mr. Dooly, who was one of the men at that same time not to make a very great departure from the permanent grade and spoil the looks of the entire street, it was decided by the committee yesterday to fill in at the Noble corner just enough to save his trees. The same action was taken in regard to Mr. Glennington's corner. It is generally agreed that these changes in the grade would mar the beauty of the street, but it was thought by the committee that it would settle the litigation.

In regard to the paving of the south side of the street the grade of which had been raised 5¢ per sq. ft. by Col. Wall, the committee decided to let the matter remain as it is, although the approved plans and grades had been departed from.

In order that there can be no departure from the approved plans for public improvements, Councilman Tuddenham will introduce a resolution Tuesday evening limiting the duties and powers of the board of public works.

Among other things the resolution will prohibit any departure from the plans and specifications after they are approved by the council unless it approves such change.
