New York, April 26 .- Herrman Wilelm Troebner, "King of the Schnoriers," as a band of professional beggars is known, is locked up here awaiting arraignment on several complaints by the Charity organization society.

## COVERNMENT HAS A **RICHT TO ACCEPT REBATES**

Washington, April 25 .- The attorney general today sustained the secretary of the interior in his rebate agreements with railroads, in connection with the transportation of material for reclamation purposes.

The law which the attorney-general interprets as governing the case is con-tained in section 22 of the interstate commerce act. Its language is: "That nothing in this act shall apply to the carriage, storage or handling of prop-erty free, or at reduced rates, for the United States."

The intention of section 22 of the act to regulate commerce was to give express sanction to any arrangement between the United States, state or mu-nicipal governments and railroad com-panies by which these governments might relieve themselves of the cost of transportation in whatever form it

transportatian in whatever form it might assume, and the section should be construed to give effect to that intention,' In another part of his opinion he

says: "That in those cases where the fact is that the United States receives the whole of the concession and the contractors none, then neither the spirit nor the letter of the act to regulate commerce has been violated."

## CHARCE OF PERJURY FALSE.

Declared to Rest Upon a Garbled Report-More Coutribution s Solicited.

New York, Aprill 25,-Starr J. Murphy, of John D. Rockefeller's private counsel, today issued the following statement by Mr. Rockefeller's author-

"In his latest attack upon Mr. Rockefeller, Dr. Washington Gladden seeks to make out a case of perjury, and in doing so assumes paternity for a falsehood which has been frequently published during the past 10 years, and

until now never answered. The testimony is taken from a report of an investigation relative to trusts, in the New York senate, in 1885, pages 419-420. Any one turning to that report will find that Mr. Rockefeller's testimony to the effect that he was not 'in such a com-pany' did not refer to the South Im-provement company at all, but to an-other and entirely different corpora-tion called the Southern Improvement tion called the Southern Improvement

tion called the Southern Improvement company. "There were two corporations, the South Improvement company and the Southern Improvement company. The Southern Improvement company was incorporated in Pennsylvania on April 16, 1870, and Mr. Rockefeller was not connected with it. The South Imprové-ment company was incorporated in May, 1871, and Mr. Rockefeller was connected with it. The charters of both these companies are printed in full in the statutes of Pennsylvania, and are accessible to all.

Aden, Arabla. April 25,-The situation Turkish Arabia has become critical, transpires that only a thousand of the Turkish troops sent to the relief of

the Turkish troops sent to the relief of Riza Pasha reached Sanna, and these fled thither after sustaining a defeat at the hands of the insurgents. Riza Pasha's troops, 6,000 strong, en-countered the Arabs in great force five miles south of Sanaa March 30, and af-ter a sharp encounter most of the troops, consisting of Syraian reserves, laid down their arms or descried, the reach Sanaa the same evening with only 50 camel loads of supplies. The chief of staff, Izzat Pasha, was killed and seven guns were abandoned and taken possession of by the Arabs, who also captured 200 camels laden with provisions and large quantities of rides and ammunition.
