

FINE CLAY DEPOSITS.

Raw Material for China and Porcelain Ware-Funeral of Wm. E. Taylor.

Lehi, Utah Co., Sept. 8.—Wednesday Kendail & Co., who own large kaolin beds in Cedar valley, west of Lehi, re-ceived a diploma and madai from the St. Louis World's Fair authorities for having the best kaolin clay exhibit at the fair. An analysis of the clay shows it to contain 31 per cent alumi-num, 49 per cent silica, 14.7 per cent water, a trace of line and a trace of iron. Mr. Homer Kendall, manager of the company, has just had erected a crushing plant here and is preparing to supply on an extensive scale model-ing clay for the public schools of Utah and slater states. All teachers who have used it pronounce it as the best of clay for this purpose as it does not affect the most delicate skin and is excellent for modeling purposes. Up to the present time the clay has been used the present time the clay has been used mostly for making fire brick in Salt Lake City and for school purposes, but from tests made of this clay recently at Swansea. Wales, it is the best of its kind for making the finest china and porcelain ware, and arrengements are being made in the east for using the clay to make these wares

being made in the east for using the clay to make these wares. The clay beds, which are near the railroad to Mercur, cover hundreds of acres and is practically inexhaustible. A red clay is just under the ground while under this layer of red clay is the white clay which is of the finest qualwhite clay which is of the finest quality.






